The Mission has its own college and training-school, for the education of pastors and natives teachers. The churches have their own Missionary Society, which raises, for home and. foreign purposes, from a thousand to thirteen Hebron, Yarmouth, on the second Tuesday in Dec. hundred pounds a year. Such is the condition of the Jamaica Mission, fifty years after Mr. Rowe the first Missionary landed at Montego Bay."

These churches of coloured brethren have the donors. for some time past maintained a mission in Africa in charge of one or more of their own people, which bids tair to be highly useful; and they are now making an effort to raise an extra fund of £5000 for establishing a larger number of schools and for sustaining and enlarging their missionary efforts. As before remarked, we have thought it not improbable that some of the readers of the Messenger, who are not too young to remember the lively interest once felt among our churches on the subject of slavery in Jamaica, might be gratified by the foregoing account of the present state of the Baptist interest in the Island.
