

LATEST FROM EUROPE.

FRANCE.

The prospects of the French vineyards were said to be excellent.

The election for a Deputy at Clermont-Ferrand had resulted in the success of the Opposition candidate.

When The Emperor of the French arrived in Paris from Algeria he was welcomed by crowds of people, who thronged the streets and cheered him as he passed along from the railway-station. There was a partial illumination of the city at night in honour of his return. On leaving Algeria, the Emperor addressed a proclamation to the French soldiers, praising their high qualities, and thanking them for the labours they had gone through in the service of their country. Africa, he says, "is the great school for the education of the soldier." He there learns "to face danger, to endure privations, and to prefer honour and duty to all material enjoyments."

The Paris papers are full of roseate and enthusiastic accounts of the defeat and dispersion of Juarist bands in Mexico. For the hundredth time we are assured that the Imperialists are absolutely triumphant everywhere. The throne which the Emperor Maximilian has so recently ascended is not, however, altogether a "bed of roses." He has deemed it necessary to send an envoy to his Imperial cousin of France, to complain of the menacing attitude of the Americans towards his newly-established empire. In an energetic despatch we are told the Emperor Napoleon has communicated his opinion to the Cabinet at Washington, informing them that Mexico is under the protection of France, threatening vengeance upon any adventurer or filibuster who may be supposed to entertain hostile intentions against the Empire.

ITALY.

It is stated that the Pope stipulated for the following conditions before signing a convention with King Victor Emanuel: That the royal *ezequatur* or oath of allegiance should be abolished in the case of the new bishops not belonging to the former Provinces of Sardinia; that no reduction or diminution shall take place in the existing dioceses; and lastly, that the bishops be allowed full liberty in the management of their seminaries to the exclusion of all government authority.

A telegram of the 24th, from Rome, says: "The Italian Ministry has rejected the conditions proposed by the Pope for the settlement of the question of the Bishops. On Friday last Signor Vegezzi had a private audience of the Pope, in order to take leave, and his mission to be considered at an end. He leaves Rome tomorrow. The interruption of the negotiations has been received with great satisfaction by the clerical party."

TURIN, June 13.—An agent of Juarez has arrived here to entice officers and men who formerly served under Garibaldi for the Juarist Army in Mexico. It is asserted that the chiefs of the Party of Action have rejected his offers.

EGYPT.

The cholera continued its ravages at Alexandria. The deaths from the disease up to June 20, numbered 1,034.

Twenty thousand of the inhabitants are stated to have quitted the city.

PRUSSIA.

There was a singular scene in the Prussian Chamber of Deputies on Thursday. It appears that a duel was threatened between M. von Bismarck and Deputy Virchow, owing to offensive expressions used by the latter during a debate. Herr Forkenbeck called on the President to stop the threatened meeting, but he said he had no power to do so.
