

...is under contract, to be completed in four years. The work of building the line from Bangor to the boundary will not be commenced, however, until a subscription to the stock of \$400,000 or \$500,000 is secured at this end. The prospect is now favorable.

Halifax and Quebec.

It is matter of much regret amongst many of our merchants, that the line of steamers between Quebec and Halifax did not continue her trips. They commenced at the wrong time of the year to secure immediately a continuance of freights, and discontinued just when they might be making a profitable business, and if now running would probably have more than could be carried. The present state of things with the United States will have the effect of greatly increasing the commerce between this province and Canada. The following remarks from the Montreal Gazette are worthy of consideration:—

“Although the establishment of a regular line of boats, would, no doubt, in a year or two, create a trade out of which the line would ultimately realize a handsome business; yet there is risk, and such a risk will not be undertaken unless a charter be granted giving the Company privileges, or a reasonable subsidy, be allowed by the Governments of Canada, New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island for carrying the mails. If such arrangements are entered into by the Governments, we have reason to know that a first-rate line of steamships will be put on and go into operation next summer. The terms of the charter would not be objectionable, and the amount of subsidy divided between the four Provinces would be scarcely worth taking into account, when compared with the trade between the Provinces which would be created—the industrial resources which would be developed—the natural bond of social and commercial intercourse which would be secured—and the general advantages to all the Provinces which would result. The steamboats which would be engaged in the trade between Montreal, Quebec, and Maritime Provinces during open navigation, could run from Halifax to the West Indies during the winter months.”

The Cunard Steamer Cuba has just arrived as we go to press.

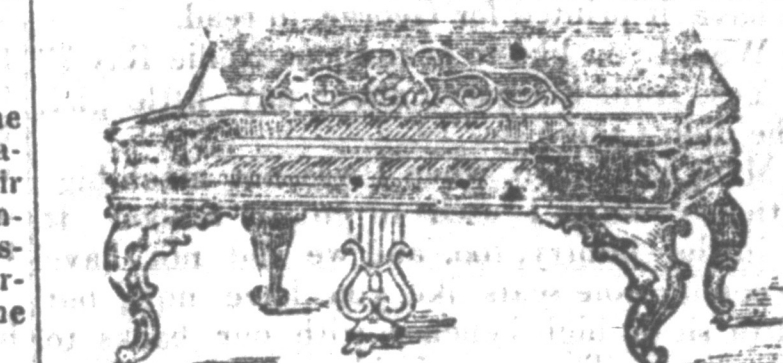

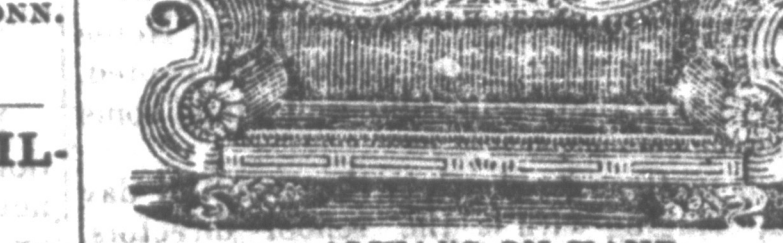
