

MEXICO.—If we may credit the U States correspondents in Mexico there is anything but a settled state of things in that country; a telegram on Wednesday last states that military operations are to be actively resumed in October and that "the country is rapidly going to destruction between the French, the Liberals, and the Guerrillas. Cortinas had made a capture of \$100,000 in silver. Juarez was still at Chihuahua. Many arbitrary arrests are reported by Maximilian's government. The Liberals are masters of Durango, and have captured several hundred Belgians. Maximilian promises a line of steamers between New Orleans and Vera Cruz."

It is doubtful if there is much of truth in these alarms; probably they are but the expression of the wishes of the writers.

THE BUOYS OF THE ATLANTIC CABLE SEEN.—Captain Lowther, of the ship *Madras*, from London, who arrived at Quebec on Monday, has kindly furnished the *Chronicle* with the following extract from his Log book: "August 29, 6 p. m., latitude 52. 12 N. longitude 87. 20: passed about a mile to leeward of a large buoy, painted a darkish red color with a flag-staff having a red, white and red color flying, apparently new, with a flat black ball on the top of staff, and having two smaller buoys or barrels lashed alongside."

Captain Lowther expresses himself confidently that these buoys were stationary, from the fact that a strong breeze was blowing at the time, and from the particular observation he took of them.

The *Cork Reporter* announces that Government had ordered a number of gunboats and two men of war to be stationed off Bantry Bay, and other stations on the west coast of Ireland.
