LICENSED CAB DRIVERS may charge for half a mile, 6d.; one mile, 1s.; a mile and a half, 1s. 3d.; 2 miles, 1s. 6d.; 3 miles, 2s.

TAXMEN may charge for a load, of say 10 cwt., 1/4 mile, 7d.; 1/2 mile, 9d.; one mile, 1s. 3d., &c.
