

his neck and passed entirely through his head. He was still conscious. Detective Baker laid him on the ground, and held his head in his lap.

'It's all up now; I am gone,' he faintly articulated. Booth did not deny killing the President, but showed no sign of repentance. He said: 'Tell mother, I died for my country.'

At three minutes past seven he breathed his last, in a country barn yard, beneath the sky of the lovely spring time. After Booth died the twenty-six spectators of this last scene of the terrible tragedy, procured an old cart and horse and started off to Washington. Harrold was made to walk, but after a short distance he objected, and wanted to ride. A rope was then placed around his neck with a slip-noose, and the other end to a cavalry saddle. He took good care to walk fast enough, so that the rope should have a good deal of slack. On reaching Belle Plain, Booth's body, and Harrold in irons, were put on the steamer Ida and brought to Washington.

Booth's body was identified by Dr. May, of Washington, who had on one occasion cut a tumour from his neck, and recognized the scar thus made. It was also identified by some thirty others who were familiar with him during his life time. After his identification at Belle Plain, by order of the War Department, it is said that the body was privately interred, in the clothing which was upon it at the time Booth was shot.

The N. Y. World of the 28th however says: Yesterday the Secretary of War, without instructions of any kind, committed to Colonel Lafayette C. Baker, of the secret service, the stark corpse of J. Wilkes Booth. The secret service never fulfilled its 'volition' more secretly. 'What have you done with the body?' said I to Baker. 'That is known,' he answered, 'to only one man living besides myself. It is gone. I will not tell you where. The only man who knows is sworn to silence. Never till the great trumpeter comes shall the grave of Booth be discovered. And this is true. Last night, the 27th of April, a small row boat received the carcass of the murderer; two men were in it; they carried the body off into the darkness, and out of that darkness it will never return.'

It appears that Booth had one of his legs fractured by jumping from the box of the theatre to the stage, his spur having caught something, and that on the Sunday morning after the assassination he was taken by Harrold to Dr. Mudd, residing near Bryantown, Charles County, some thirty-five miles from Washington for surgical attendance. On Booth's person were found four navy revolvers, one Spencer carbine, one dagger with blood on it, believed to be the same one with which Major Rathbone was cut; one hundred and seventy-five dollars in greenbacks, and one sixty pound note on the Bank of Ontario, or Toronto, Canada, and a pocket diary.

Sergeant Corbett, who shot Booth, states that he fired at him with the intention of wounding but not killing him. He aimed at Booth's shoulder, but he stopped, and the ball passed through his head.

LATEST FROM EUROPE.

By the arrival of the steamer Hibernian at Port aux Basques Newfoundland on Saturday night, we learn that the news of the assassination of President Lincoln had reached Europe.

In the House of Lords, Lord John Russell gave notice that he would move an address to the Queen, expressing sorrow and indignation at the assassination of President Lincoln. In the House of Commons Sir George Gray gave a similar notice. Two great meetings were held in Liverpool, and unanimously adopted resolutions expressing horror, and sorrow, at the assassination. The Commercial body of London adopted similar resolutions, also official bodies in various towns of England.

In the House of Commons Mr. Gladstone made the annual financial statement, by which it appeared that there was a surplus of nearly four millions of pounds. He proposes to take two pence off the income tax, sixpence off the tea duty, reduce fire insurance duty to one and sixpence, with other minor changes. The papers generally approve of the scheme.

The Italian Chamber passed an address expressing grief at Lincoln's assassination. Letters from Paris say that profound and universal regret and indignation prevails there.

Mason, in a letter to the Confederate paper Index, published in London, repudiates the crime on behalf of the South.
