## NEWS SUMMARY.

By the last mail from England we observe some further changes in Lord Russell's Cabinet. Sir Robert Peel is to be replaced by Mr. Chichester Fortescue, one of the undersecretaries of State for the Colonies, as Secretary for Ireland, and Mr. Forster succeeds him as under Secretary for the Colonies. The First Lord of the Admirality to succeed the Duke of Somerset, has not been yet appointed. The New Cabinet will not be with. \$5. M. Sibley, \$2.86. Rev. S. March. J. G. out important questions to discuss and settle. Among them will be that of the extension of the Elective franchise in England. A tenpound rental is at present the lowest qualification for voting for a member of Parliament. Frequent efforts have been made in the Legislature for some years past to reduce it to six pounds, which it is very probable Lord Russell's ministry will support in the Commons. The final settlement of the various points of difference with the United States Government will also be a question of grave importance to both countries; but as both are at present very unwilling to proceed to extremes, it is to be hoped that no serious obstacle may stand in the way of the continuance of friendly relations.

The vigorous and decided measures adopted by the Irish Government to suppress the Fenian conspiracy, is producing the desired effect. Two of the principal leaders had been convicted, and each sentenced to twenty years penal servitude. The trials were still going on. No serious apprehension appears to be entertained of any outbreak. All the influence of character or property, whether Catholic or Protestant, is in strong opposition to the infatuated attempts of the Fenians to disturb the peace of the country.

Gordon. a member of the Colonial Legislature, upon the sentence of a Court Martial composed chiefly of a few young naval officers, is generally looked upon as murder, under the mere semblance of a trial, and the shooting and hanging of about 2000 persons, male and temale, almost without enquiry, has produced throughout the kingdom a general feeling of THE SUBSCRIBER offers for sale that wellhorror and disgust. Large public meetings were being held to petition the Government to institute an impartial and vigorous enquiry. Mr. Gordon, by every account that can be gathered, was a man of unblemished character and high respectability. He was undoubtedly a religious man, a member of the Church of England and not a Baptist, but as he was a man of property and liberality, was an active agent in whatever concerned the promotion of religious or benevolent objects in every denomination. Mr. G., who was a coloured man, well educated and of considerable ability, had been a strong advocate for justice being dono to the blacks, which it evidently appears they had not received at the hands of the Government of the Island. His language in some of his popular addresses may have been imprudent, considering the ignorance of those he was addressing, but no one possessed of common sease could torture it into sedition or rebellion.
