St. JOHN.—The Religious Interest in our city churches is favorable at present. Special services have been in healthful progress for some weeks in Leinster Street, and the pastor, Rev. W. V. Garner, had the pleasure of baptizing seven persons on Sabbath morning last.

The meetings in Brussels Street have been unusually full for sometime past, and the pastor, Rev. S. Robinson, is much encouraged. He baptized one last Lord's day, and hopes soon to administer the sacred rite to others.

The interest in Germain Street is brightening. Rev. T. F. Powers is still preaching the word with earnestness and zeal, and we trust good is being done.

The pastors of Portland and Carleton and their respective churches are enjoying spiritual refreshment from above.

Our Free brethren in Waterloo Street have had tokens of reviving mercy. Their pastor, Rev. M. Gunter, has baptized a number recently.

Rev. W. A. Corey, who is now in the city, informs us that he has baptized willing converts at Springfield, his field of labour, nearly every Sabbath. About twenty persons have received the sacred rite, and the meetings are still encouraging.—Visitor.

GERMAIN STREET CHURCH.—The St. John Morning Telegraph gives the following respecting the service at the opening of the basement of the New Church:

We are glad to see that our Baptist friends of Germain Street are progressing admirably in the erection of their new church. The Vestry was opened for Divine Service on Sabbath last at 11 o'clock, a. m. It is a chaste room, between fifty and sixty feet square eleven feet high, and having two or three committee rooms adjoining on the south end. On one side is a Baptistery, the cover of which serves as a platform for the speaker. The entrance is on Queen street. So far this new edifice promises to be one of the most elegant and commodious churches in the city.

The opening service which was conducted by Rev. I. E. Bill, was a perfect success. He was assisted by Rev. Messrs. Cady and Spencer, and Dr. Day. All the rooms and the aisles, from the platform to the door, were a perfect jam, and all passed off in admirable style. The sermon by Mr. Bill was founded upon Romans xiv. 8. "Whether we live therefore or die, we are the Lord's." This the Rev. gentleman elucidated in a variety of ways, making a highly talented and impressive discourse. He referred to the life and death of the late pastor of the congregation, the Rev. Mr. Vaughan, in very feeling terms. In speaking of the new structure he said, the old house which occupied the ground upon which you have erected your present elegant structure, long stood as a monument of the zeal, piety and liberality of a past generation. That house was opened for the worship of God in 1818, forty-six years ago. The good men who laid its foundations, reared its walls, and dedicated it to the service of Jehovah, have all passed away. And of all the members of the church that were present at that opening service, one only survives—Mrs. Thomas Harding. By far the larger proportion of all the ministers who preached the Gospel in that house, have gone to the Upper Sanctuary to be pillars in the temple of God above; and out of the hundreds converted to the truth in that consecrated place, how many have passed the flood. The memory of many of these departed worthies is still fresh and fragrant. He here referred in feeling terms to the preachers who had charge of the congregation in former times, as well as to the former worshippers in the sanctuary.

The Rev. gentleman re-delivered this discourse on Sabbath evening in the Brussels Street Church, and will repeat it in Portland next Sabbath evening.

AN ABANDONED SHIP.—On the afternoon of the 6th of January, the Armenian, from the West Coast of Africa, fell in with the new ship Phryne, abandoned at sea. The ship is 1300 tons register, and was bound from St. John, N. B. to Liverpool, with a cargo of timber. The Phryne was abandoned about the 10th of December, off the Portuguese coast, with loss of rudder, and the insurance effected on her by her owners in Liverpool amounted on last Monday to about £20,000. Captain Leamon, of the Armenian, sent a boat along side the derelict, which on examination proved to be perfectly tight and seaworthy, as she had only 19 inches of water in her hold. He at once put on board a volunteer crew, under the command of Capt. McKenzie, who was returning on leave of absence from the coast, where he commanded the African Company's ship William Money. Captain McKenzie, after receiving a supply of provisions, water, rope and some sails, was directed to steer north, as the weather was fine, and the wind fresh from the south-east. When boarded the Phryne's hull was in very good order, as were also her masts and yards. She had four sails bent, but, beyond this, the ship was stripped of all her running gear.—English paper.

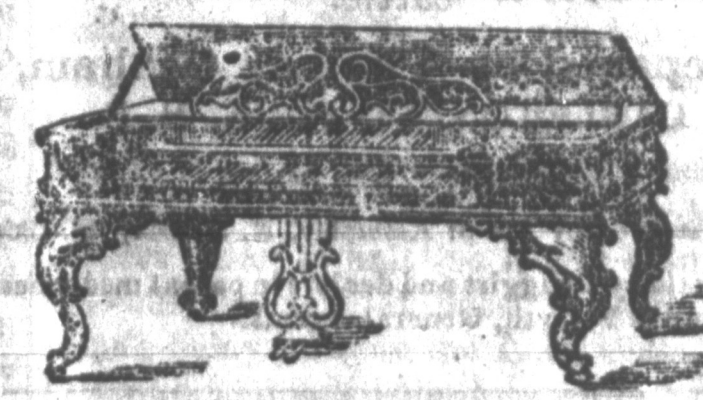
