

Evening.—Subscriptions to the 730 loan on Saturday reached thirty and a half millions. Total subscriptions for the week ninety-eight millions. The first series of the loan now being nearly absorbed, the Government has decided to put into the market the balance of two hundred and thirty millions on terms similar to the first. Dick Taylor, the only remaining Confederate General east of the Mississippi, has surrendered. Jefferson Davis, under a strong court, was expected to reach Macon on the 18th. The Military Court, for trial of the alleged assassins, was thrown open to the reporters on Saturday. Several columns of testimony have been telegraphed to the press and published. Gold 130.

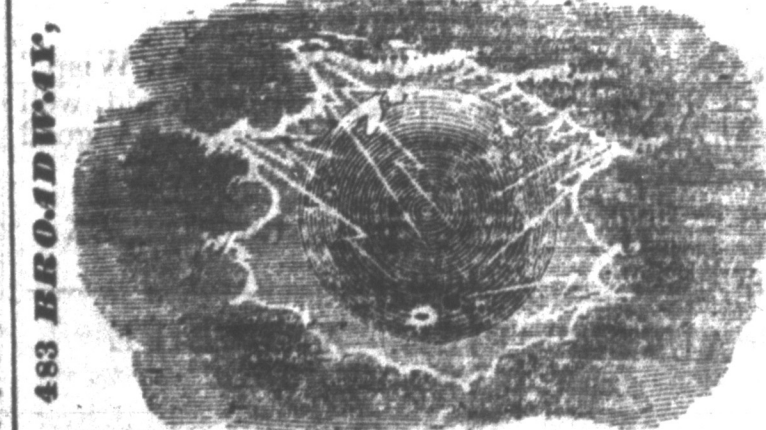
