Too well the leaders of rebellion in Tennessee knew his power over the people; and they were conscious that if he were permitted to make public speeches the people would sally round him-that he could preserve Tennessee from their fatal sway. He stood firm, and yet stands firm, as a monument of loyalty and devotion to his country, while many of his contemporaneous political lights have been for ever extinguished and enshrouded in the perfidy of the conspiracy against the life of the nation. Among his old political friends he saw Isham G. Harris, the late Governor of Tennessee; A. O. P. Nicholson, his colleague in the United States Senate; Andrew Ewing, Langdon C. Haynes and a host of others fall into the secession pit. Of his political opponents he saw E. H. Ewing, G. A. Henry, the "Eagle orator," his opponent the first time he was elected Governor of Tennessee, and who said, in the Bell and Everett Convention in Baltimore, that he wished he might be struck blind before he should ever see the the Union dissolved; even Bell, whose wisdom had shone as a beacon light to the nation for more than a quarter of a century, cower before the monster session.


