

LATEST FROM THE U. STATES.

NEW YORK, Oct. 30, p. m.—Some 70,000 tons of coal, belonging to a gas company up town, is on fire, having been burning three days.

The *Herald's* St. Thomas correspondence, of the 7th inst., says that the gunboat *Kansas* arrived there on the 5th, bringing news of the surrender of Cape Haytien to Geffard. Gold 145.

On Sunday morning the steamboat *St. John*, of the People's Line, running between New York and Albany, exploded her port boiler when near New York, killing seven persons and scalding seventeen others.

The steamer *Republic* which sailed from New York for New Orleans on the 18th inst., was wrecked off the coast of Georgia on the 25th inst. A boat containing the Captain, some of the crew and a few of the passengers, arrived at Charleston, S. C., on Saturday.—They reported that four boats and a raft in all put off from the steamer. The remaining boats and the rafts have not yet been heard from.

A person was arrested on Saturday, in New York, and one hundred thousand dollars in counterfeit treasury notes and fractional currency found on his premises.

It was reported in New York on Wednesday that Wirtz has been found guilty and that he would be hanged on Friday last.

RECIPROCITY.—A despatch from Boston on Saturday stated, that the U. S. Government were in possession of information that an influential delegation from Canada is about to visit Washington to make efforts to renew the Treaty of Reciprocity between the U.
