

LATEST FROM THE U. STATES.

MEMPHIS, TENN., Nov. 26.—A collision occurred last night on the Mississippi, seven miles above Helena, between the steamers Niagara and Post Boy.

FENIANS IN NEW YORK.—The Fenian flag was hoisted yesterday (25th) over their Headquarters in Union Square; they pay \$1,000 per month for the building.

TORNADO.—A telegram from New York, on Friday last, states that a tornado occurred on the Mosquito Coast on the 18th ult., sweeping away the town of Bluefield, killing many persons, and destroying all the valuable merchandize, &c., in the place and many plantations.

The schooner Deliverance, Coff, master, from Boston, at Coon Island, loading with cocoa nuts, was taken up bodily by the hurricane, carried two hundred yards inland, and landed high and dry.

An offer has been made the American Government of \$1,200 for the privilege of digging up the bones of the horses which have died around Washington during the past five years.

There have been ninety-six cases of cholera on board the Atlanta, at New York, and twenty deaths.

An artesian well in Chicago has been sunk to the depth of 695 feet.

The first-class hotels in Boston have raised their prices to \$4 50 per day.

The St. Louis Democrat says 'billious, intermittent and remittent fevers prevail more extensively this season, in Illinois, than at any time for the past twenty years.

A letter from Illinois says that owing to the high price of coal much of the corn there which cannot be sent to the seaboard at a profit, will be used for fuel.

Two white men, John M. Brown and Christopher C. Kease, having been convicted, by a military commission, of the murder of a negro, named Nellie Brest, in Taliaferro County, Georgia, were sentenced to be hanged.

MISCELLANEOUS.

SPAIN.—A telegram from New York on Wednesday last states that a Madrid letter of 1st inst, says the cholera rages at Seville in a terrible manner, and in spite of the desertion of two-thirds of the population, the daily deaths exceed 150.

The rag-pickers of Paris are nearly all dead from cholera.

It is said that some of the Canons of Westminster assisted with their own hands in filling up the grave of Lord Palmerston with mingled charcoal and sand.

A LAGOON FOR BREEDING EELS.—At Comacchio, in Italy, the fishermen live upon a lagoon, which forms an immense marsh one hundred and forty miles in circumference, and from three to six feet wide.

"FACSIMILE" SCHOOL-BOOKS.—Among the school-books used in France is one consisting of facsimiles of letters written by business men, eminent people, &c., intended to teach children the art of reading writing.

THE PRINCE IMPERIAL.—A small alteration is to be made in the Court etiquette at the Tuilleries on the return of the Imperial family from Compiegne.

A Paris letter says that upwards of 20,000 persons have left the French capital for Versailles on account of the cholera.

Upwards of \$40,000 have been raised in Great Britain to aid the Freedmen of the United States.
