SPAIN.-A telegram from New York on Wednesday last states that a Madrid letter of 1st inst, says the cholera rages at Seville in a terrible manner, and in spite of the desertion of two-thirds of the population, the daily deaths exceed 150. Last night news came that Generals Cendrera and Sagristi, and the constitutional alcaede had fallen victims.

It is said that some of the Canons of Westminster assisted with their own hands in filling up the grave of Lord Palmerston with mingled charcoal and sand. It is also said that the diamond and gold rings thrown in by Mr. Sullivan were previously removed, in order to obviate the risk of the violation of the grave.

A LAGOON FOR BREEDING EELS.-At Comacchio, in Italy, the fishermen live upon a lagoon, which forms an immense marsh one hundred and forty miles in circumference, and from three to six feet wille. It has been transtormed into an immense field for the cultivation of fish; the largest part of the harvest consist ing of cels. The fish come up in immense quantitles from the sea and enter the lagoon, which has been laboriously intersected with dykes and and are caught in certain skillul labyrinths, which they enter from migratory instinct, under the impression that they are returning to the Atlantic. The annual produce has amounted to near 4,000,000 lbs. weight, but seems to have lately fallen off. With the help of artificial piscaculture, it is said that the produce may be increased to an almost unlimited extent.
