HOLIDAY FOR THE WORKERS.—Mount Uniacke was the scene of great enjoyment on Thursday last. The whole of the employees on the Railways and their families, assembled there for a day's recreation and picnic.

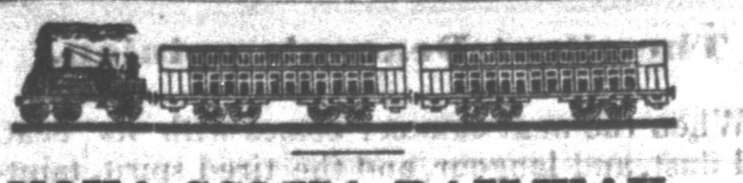
