THE FRUIT GROWERS' EXHIBITION .-Wolfville was the great centre of attraction on Wednesday last. Large numbers of people were in attendance to exhibit the truits of their skill in cultivation. The Gypasium building was fully occupied with the fruit. Vegetables of large proportions were arranged on the road outside. The show was far in advance of any previous years. The number of varieties of apples' astonished the spectators generally. Mr. Robert Starr exhibited 160 sorts, all with different names. Mr. Oliver Foster had 130 varieties. Besides these the following gentlemen had what has been beretofore considered large varieties: - Dr. Hamilton, 43 sorts; W. H. Hardwick, 21 sorts; J. W. Cornwall, 23 sorts; Richard Starr, 25 sorts; Thos. W. Chesley, 33 sorts; J. W. Barss, 24 sorts.

We learn from the Sun that "in Pearstl ere were but six competitors, the season being rather late. Among those shown were a dozen of a new sort, grown by Leander Woodworth, named "Lord Cornwaltis,"-oval shape, pink and white in color,—the handsomest pear exhibited. J. W.

Barss exhibited 7 varieties. Two varieties of apples of last year's growth, free from decay, were shewn by Richard Starr and Lewis Johnston.

In apples there were 70 competitors, whose fruit covered nearly the whole of the stands on three sides of the ball, as well as a table the entire length of the centre."

There were also a few Plums. The Quinces were the finest fruit ever grown in this province. The Grapes were large, all grown in the open air. The peaches were small. Melons, only a few. There were also Tomatos, Beets, Mangold-wuntzel, Carrets, Unions &c., &c., all fine. The Honey in the comb, and strained, and beeswax
