

LATEST FROM EUROPE.

NEW YORK, July 3, P. M.—Steamship "China" off Cape Race Sunday morning at 8 o'clock.

Whole of Atlantic cable was on board the Great Eastern, and she would sail for Valentia as soon as the paying out machinery was put up. The Great Eastern would probably leave Valentia on the 10th July, and arrive at Trinity Bay about the 24th July.

The Directors of the Company decided on a uniform tariff from all parts. United States and British North America to Great Britain £20 stg. for twenty words or less, and £1 for each added word; to the continent of Europe £20 and 21s.; Asia and Africa, £25 and 25s.; cipher messages charged double tolls; address, date and signature counted and charged for.

Present condition of cable is all that can be desired.

Parliament is engaged in closing up the business for the session.

Prince Napoleon would leave shortly for Switzerland. It is reported that his interview with the Emperor had widened the breach.

Reported that negotiations have been broken off between the Pope and the Mexican Embassy.

NEW YORK, July 3.—The *America*, from Southampton, has arrived.

In the House of Commons, Mr. Cardwell placed on the table the papers relative to Canada, giving the result of the negotiations between the Imperial Government and the Canadian Government.

The Home Government approves of the Confederation scheme, and will give every assistance. Will recommend the guarantee of a loan for the carrying out by Canada of the fortifications recommended, and will provide the necessary armament.

By the steamships *City of Boston* and *Damascus* at New York and off Port au Basque, dates to the 16th have been received.

Lord Brougham, in a speech at a banquet to the Prince of Wales at Fishmongers' Hall earnestly called on the American Government to use their victory in mercy as well as justice, and not stain the scaffold with the blood of prisoners whom they recently treated as warriors.

Parliament will be dissolved about the 10th of July.

Mrs. Lincoln sent a reply to the Empress Eugenie's letter of condolence.

It is stated that the Emperor of Austria has agreed to reinstate Maximilian in all his rights in Austria in the event of his returning from Mexico.

PROSPECT OF A ROYAL MARRIAGE.—"A report is current," says a Berlin letter, "that the Prince Royal of Hanover, who will enter on his twenty-first year in September next, is to marry his cousin, the Princess Helena, Queen Victoria's third daughter. It is said that this alliance will be finally concluded during the Queen's visit to Germany in August next."

LONDON, (England) covers an area of 120 square miles, and it has been estimated, one human being dies every eighth minute in that great city; but to overbalance this mortality, a baby is born into the world every five minutes in some house in London. Out of every 1,000 population of the world, two of them are in London. If the citizens of London were placed two and two in marching order, the line would extend 680 miles; and at three miles per hour it would take them nine days and nine nights to pass a given point.

A new and large Hotel just completed in London is seven stories high, thoroughly fire proof: contains 700 rooms, and was formally opened by the Prince of Wales.

The season is said to be about a fortnight earlier than usual in England, and the harvest promises to be very abundant.

English omnibuses have been established, which run from Jerusalem and Bethlehem to places in the neighborhood.

Two English newspapers are now published at Yokohama, in Japan—one, the Daily Japan Herald, the motto of which is "Onward, press onward"; and the other is the Weekly Japan Herald. The price to subscribers to the latter is £5 a year, or nearly 2s. per copy.

The Bishop of Chester died on the 15th.

The infant son of the Prince of Wales is to be christened Albert Christian Emmanuel. He will be known under the name of Prince Christian.

The consumption of snails (*escargots*) has become so great that it is said a special market is about to be opened for them. Epicurees say that this is not wonderful, as they were highly esteemed by the Romans. French epicures in the 16th century kept stores of snails in enclosed warrens; and Dupin, who wrote at that period, says that there were no great dinners without snails. It appears that the taste has now revived.
