Great damage was done to barns and fences in the eastern part of the province by the storm on Good Friday. In Hants County, too, quite a number of barns were blown down.

CHILD MURDER.—Mary Smith, charged with having murdered her child in the woods back of the Three-mile House, was examined before the Stipendiary Magistrate in the County Court House. After a lengthy investigation the woman was fully committed to take her trial for wilful murder, before the Supreme Court.

THE WATER PIPES of the City of Halifax are said to extend nearly 24 miles.

BUILDING OPERATIONS are being resumed at the Provincial Building and in several other parts of the city.

EXHIBITION PRIZES.—A public meeting will be held in Temperance Hall on Friday evening next at 7 1/2 o'clock, at which time the Dublin Exhibition prizes will be distributed. At the same meeting preparations for the Paris Exhibition will be inaugurated. There will be no charge for admission on this occasion.

A FIRE occurred in a house adjoining Keith's Brewery Lower Water Street on Saturday morning last.

DESERPTION.—A woman name Morash has been sent to jail, awaiting trial at the city criminal court for having deserted her infant a few weeks old. The child was left in a house where she had been staying, and certain facts which have come to light would lead to the inference that foul play was intended. The prisoner is unmarried.

SUDDEN DEATHS.—The Rev. Archibald Gray, a venerable and respectable resident of this city, died suddenly at Windsor, on Saturday last.

We regret to learn that a telegram was received on Saturday, announcing the death in Montreal, through an accident, of a promising young son of P. Power, Esq., of this city.

GOLD MINING at Tangier is again looking up. Considerable amounts of the precious ore have recently been received in this city from the Ety claim, including a single specimen valued at \$600 to \$800.

MILITARY DESERTERS.—Three men of the 16th regt. deserted from the Eastern Battery on Saturday afternoon. A lieutenant, sergeant, corporal, and one of the military police went in pursuit and succeeded in arresting two of the parties, the third escaped to the woods. On their way back the prisoners, aided it is said by the military policeman, turned on the corporal in charge, beat him severely and then effected their escape. Afterwards, we understand, they fell in with a man named Beamish, near Porter's Lake, and after dragging him into the bush, robbed him of every cent in his possession.

The officer who went in pursuit of the deserters returned to town, without seeing the second, and is satisfied they are in the woods around Ketch Harbor. He separated from the sergeant, and as no tidings of the latter have been yet received, much anxiety is entertained for his safety. Some fifty men were in pursuit of the deserters, on Saturday last.

COMPLAINTS are very justly made of certain parties being taken to the lock-up and then released by the Aldermen without trial. The certainty of punishment is the great security against crime. Partiality to criminals brings the administrators of the law into contempt.

FRACAS.—At our Police Court, on Monday last, William Miller, M. P. P., and Samuel MacDonnell, M. P. P., pleaded guilty to a charge of having assaulted Mr. A. J. Ritchie, proprietor of the Sun newspaper, in the public street. The former was fined \$20, and the latter \$10. The occasion of this breach of the peace was a charge of corrupt motives for their recently expressed views on confederation, attributed to these gentlemen in the columns of the Sun.

CHOLERA.—The steamship England, 3307 tons, Capt. Grace, which sailed from Liverpool, G. B., for New York, twelve days ago, with 1202 passengers, put into our harbor on Monday. On Tuesday, last week, cholera broke out among the passengers, and up to the time of the vessel's arrival here, 46 deaths had occurred from that pestilence, and 80 others were upon the sick list. During Monday six others died. The steamer was ordered to quarantine, and now lies at anchor at Meagher's Beach. As it was understood that the medical officers of the ship were too sick for duty, Dr. Farvie and Dr. Slayter, volunteered to go on board and discharge the duties of physicians during the voyage to New York.

The Government at first ordered the ship to sea, but on account of the rapid spread of the disease, and the want of engineers, who are sick from cholera, it was found impossible for the ship to proceed on the voyage. The receiving ship Pyramus, has been obtained to take part of the passengers on board, and shanties will be erected on the beach near the light-house for the sick.

CIVIC.—We are in receipt of the Annual Report of the several departments of the City Government of Halifax. All the details of our city revenues, expenditure, property, &c., &c., are here given. From the report of the City Marshal it appears that during the year there were 2120 criminal commitments, of which 1269 were for drunkenness, 166 for larceny, and 559 for breaches of license law and city ordinances. The pamphlet deserves careful perusal by every citizen.

New Brunswick.

It is said that the New Brunswick Government are ready to co-operate with the other Provinces in a plan of Union that will meet the objections now taken by many persons to the Quebec scheme. On this understanding, it is added, they have been sustained in the House of Assembly.—Rep.

A few days ago all the branch pilots of the Port of Miramichi, N. B. sent in their resignations to the clerk of the peace for the county of Northumberland. The pilots have adopted this course of action in consequence of an order passed by the sessions reducing their rates of pilotage to what they consider anything but a fair remuneration for their services.

FATAL ACCIDENT.—A man named Mc Carthy, engaged in mooring a ship in the harbor of St. John, on Monday 2nd, accidentally came in contact with the chain of the anchor, which was dropping at the time, and melancholy to relate was instantly killed. The body was frightfully mutilated.

A FAST LADY.—The Bqe. "Jessie," Cap. B. R. Grant, of this town, has just made the passage from New York to Cardenas, Cuba, in 6 days and 7 hours. The "Jessie" was built last year at Bay Side by O. B. Rideout, Esq.—St. Andrews Standard.

LATEST FROM THE U. STATES.

APPROPRIATE WORK FOR THE FENIANS.—Swindlers now make tours of the New York kitchens, persuading the cooks to invest in bogus Fenian bonds. One girl had promised them \$5, when they over-reached themselves by the remark that the girls' next door had given \$15. "Sure the girls next door are niggers," said Bridget, and started for the police office; but the imposters escaped.

Eighteen lumbermen were recently poisoned in the town of Michigan, by their cook mistaking a paper of strychnine for saleratus and mixing up some bread with it, of which they ate and died. The poison was brought to their camp by a trapper who designed it for use on meat with which he baited his traps for wild animals.

It is said that a number of Canadians, residents in New York, have formed a society to agitate for Canadian independence.

MOBILE, 5th.—Schooner "Eugenie," from Pensacola, reports the destruction by fire of the United States steamer "Convoy," Capt. Williams, by the overthrowing of a lamp in the engine room. The captain and crew escaped in boats in their night clothes. One person was killed, and several injured. Nothing was saved.

NEW YORK, 7TH, INST.—The Police arrested yesterday, John Rosser, a seaman on board the ship "Charles Sprague," from Newport, Wales, charged by Capt. Pike with attempting to sink his ship by boring holes in her with an inch augur while lying in Newport Roads. Rosser confessed the whole case after being arrested, stating that his reasons for doing it were hard usage by the mates of the ship. He says he only wanted to make her leak so bad that he might get rid of going to sea in her.

NOTICE is hereby given, that the Four new Light-houses erected during the summer in this Province, undermentioned and described, are now and will be in operation from this date until further notice:—

The Light-house on Flint Island, on the eastern coast of the Island of Cape Breton, on the sight of the former light-house, in lat. 45deg. 11min. 5sec. N., lon. 59 deg. 47m. W.; exhibits a Revolving Light 65 feet above high water, attaining its greatest brilliancy every fifteen seconds. The building is octagonal in form, painted white, and is forty-three feet high from base to vane.

The Light-house on Green Island, near the south-east end of Madame Island, off the town of Arichat, Cape Breton Island, in lat. 45deg. 28min. 51sec. N., lon. 68deg. 52min. 40sec. W.; is situated on the summit of the Island, and exhibits a fixed Light, elevated 70 feet above high water. The Lantern is placed on the top of the Keeper's dwelling, which is painted white. Height from base of dwelling to top of Lantern, 31 feet.

The Light-house on Egg Island, on the south-east coast of this Province, in lat. 44deg. 39min. 51sec. N., lon. 62deg. 51mi. 32sec. W.; is situated nearly on the centre of the Island, and exhibits a Revolving Light 85 feet above high water, attaining its greatest brilliancy every minute, showing alternately Red and White, and stands twelve yards south-east of the Keeper's dwelling.

The Light-house on Little Hope Island, on the south-east coast of this Province, in lat. 43deg. 48min. 31sec. N. lon. 64deg. 47min. 15sec. W.; is situated nearly in the centre of this Island, and exhibits a Revolving Red Light, elevated 40 feet above high water, attaining its greatest brilliancy every minute. The Lantern is placed on the top of the Keeper's dwelling, which is painted white. Height from base of dwelling to top of lantern, 31 feet.

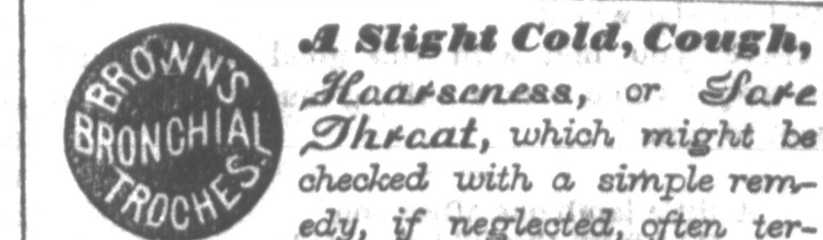
