

London, August 17, noon.—The final negotiations for the establishment of peace between Prussia and Austria, and between Austria and Italy, are in progress, and peace is regarded as certain.

MISCELLANEOUS.

COST OF CABLE DESPATCHES.—The despatches published in the Boston and New York papers, a few days ago, cost at the rate of a Sovereign a word, which for 1,158 words as published that morning, amounted to the nice little sum of \$8,569. But notwithstanding the cost, the Associated Press are endeavouring to make a contract with the cable company for some 200 words per day, more or less, from Europe, to be published morning and evening regularly, and the public will be furnished with the intelligence from London, Paris, Berlin, Vienna and St. Petersburg, of the same date as the news from New York or Washington.

The French Empress has presented to the Imperial Library of Paris a large Bible in two volumes, of the 13th century, recently brought from Arabia. It is written on vellum, contains many valuable marginal notes, is illustrated in a very curious and exquisite manner, and is altogether a splendid specimen of old works of this kind.

The subjoined despatches were forwarded by Marshal Benedek to the Emperor Francis Joseph during the action at Skalitz.—"Eight in the morning: the action is commencing. Pray to God! Noon: The battalions are wavering. Pray to God! Four in the afternoon: The Prussians are beaten. Return thanks to God!"

MIRACULOUS PRESERVATION.—A German journal recounts the following episode of one of the late battles.—"A young soldier in the midst of the tumult of battle thought he saw on the grass a four-leaved shamrock growing. As such a plant is rare, and is considered good luck, he stopped to take it. At that very instant a cannon ball passed over his head so near that he must have been killed if he had not been bending down. The man so miraculously saved, has sent the plant to which he owed his life to his betrothed at Konigsberg."

A Forbes newspaper records that the heat at mid-day two weeks ago was so great that the combs of a Skep in Bullet Loan were melted, and the bees drowned in the liquid honey! This is the second occurrence of the same kind on the western slopes of the Cluny Hills.

A Dublin letter states that the spirit of content reigns everywhere in Ireland at the present time. Various causes have contributed to produce this happy state of things—chiefly the prospect of a most abundant harvest, and the almost entire exemption of the country from cattle plague.
