

The natives of Bengal have commenced the collection of a fund which they intend to place at the service of Dr. Colenso, but the motive of the movement is not mentioned.

NEW ZEALAND.

The war in New Zealand was still prosecuted with vigour by the colonists, and some successes are reported.

In the colony of Victoria, the constitutional difficulty with reference to the passing of the Appropriation Bill had not been surmounted, and the Government had accordingly applied to the country. Parliament was dissolved on the 12th of December, and when the matter left the elections were proceeding amidst great excitement.

CHILI AND PERU.

The latest news from Chili reports the rising of the blockade of Coquimbo by the Spanish squadron. The successor of Admiral Irujo has learnt by experience how unsafe it is to scatter his squadron and leave individual vessels to encounter the enterprise of the Chilians, so he has concentrated all his forces at Valparaiso and Caldera, which are now the two ports blockaded. The Chilians were doing brisk business at the unblockaded ports.

MISCELLANEOUS.

ECCENTRICITIES OF CONGRESS.—A curious account of the manners and customs in the American House of Representatives is given by the Washington correspondent of *The Times*. He thinks the plan of special desks fatal to good debating. Each Member sits at his desk writing letters or reading newspapers. If he wants to post his letters, he claps his hands for a messenger. While a gentleman is speaking the messengers race past him, and, not to mention other distractions, the children of Representatives are admitted to the House.

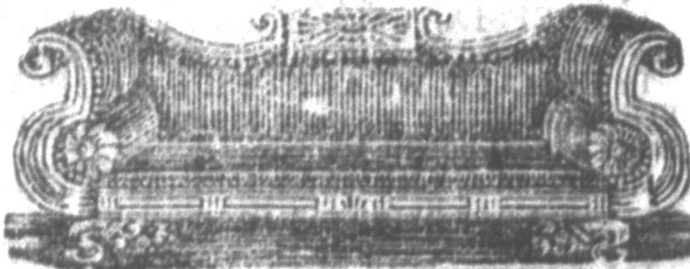

NOTICE is hereby given, that the Four new Lighthouses erected during the summer in this Province, undermentioned and described, are now and will be in operation from this date until further notice:

The Light-house on Flint Island, on the eastern coast of the Island of Cape Breton, on the right of the former light-house, in lat. 46deg. 11min. 50sec. N., lon. 59 deg. 47min. W.; exhibits a Revolving Light 65 feet above high water, attaining its greatest brilliancy every fifteen seconds. The building is octagonal in form, painted white, and is forty-three feet high from base to vane.

The Light-house on Green Island, near the south-east end of Madras Island, of the town of Arichat, Cape Breton Island, in lat. 46deg. 23min. 51sec. N., lon. 60deg. 53min. 49sec. W.; is situated on the summit of the Island, and exhibits a Fixed Light, elevated 70 feet above high water. The lantern is placed on the top of the Keeper's dwelling, which is painted white. Height from base of dwelling to top of Lantern, 31 feet.

The Light-house on Egg Island, on the south-east coast of this Province, in lat. 44deg. 39min. 51sec. N., lon. 62deg. 61min. 32sec. W.; is situated nearly on the centre of the Island, and exhibits a Revolving Light 85 feet above high water, attaining its greatest brilliancy every minute, showing alternately Red and White, and stands twelve yards south-east of the Keeper's dwelling.

The Light-house on Little Hope Island, on the south-east coast of this Province, in lat. 43deg. 48min. 32sec. N., lon. 64deg. 47min. 15sec. W.; is situated nearly in the centre of this Island, and exhibits a Revolving Red Light, elevated 40 feet above high water, attaining its greatest brilliancy every minute. The lantern is placed on the top of the Keeper's dwelling, which is painted white. Height from base of dwelling to top of lantern, 21 feet.
