CIVIC.—A motion was made on Friday last to appropriate \$2000 for a new fire-bell. This was opposed on the ground that a lot should be purchased on Barrack Street for an Engine and Drying House. The motion was lost. The Health Inspector's salary, (Mr. Spike) was raised to \$800, and the assistant's (Mr. Shean) to \$500.

MELANCHOLY ACCIDENT.—Mr. John Lawlor, son of Mr. Lawlor, proprietor of the Island of that name, at the entrance of Halifax Harbor, came to his death by the upsetting of a Whale boat in the Eastern Passage, on Monday the 18th, while on his way to the city.

INTERNATIONAL EXHIBITION OF 1867.—At a meeting of the Nova Scotia Commission held in the Legislative Council Chamber on Friday the 14th instant, a letter from the Honorable the Provincial Secretary, received by the China, was read by the Vice Chairman, expressing a hope that the preparations in Nova Scotia for the Paris Exhibition were being pressed forward, as the termination of the war in Europe left no doubt that the original intentions of the French Commission would be punctually carried out.

Propositions and Contributions from various quarters were reported.

Some exceedingly fine specimens of marbles from the vicinity of Five Islands were exhibited by T. M. Jones, Esq., of pure white, yellow and green, and also of purple colors; the information regarding these a id other varieties in that quarter was of a very gratifying nature.

It was resolved that meetings of the Commission be held hereafter every week.

OUTRAGE.—On Saturday morning early a seaman, belonging to a vessel lying at Oxley's wharf, discharged a gun at a policeman, sent to arrest the man. Fortunately the shot did not take effect. The seaman was arrested, conveyed to the lock-up, and is to be tried before the City Criminal Court.

THE CROPS IN ANNAPOLIS COUNTY.—The wet weather still continues, and is producing disastrous effects upon the crops,—the high tides and the rains have destroyed much hay in this county. There is an alarming prospect of general potatoe-rot. A good deal of grain, too, will be much injured by the profuse showers that are descending daily. The earth has yielded abundantly the present season, but the destroyer is abroad, and much injury is being done to the crops.—Free Press.

THE SABBATH SCHOOL PICNIC at Amherst on the 4th inst. appears to have given great satisfaction to all who participated.

The Superintendent, W. F. Cotten was more than usually active in his endeavours to gratify the young people.

Dr. Hurd was present and gave a brief Address. Mr. Mellish, also the Teacher of the Academy, added to the mental feast, whilst Rev. G. F. Miles supplied words of cheerfulness, encouragement and hope.

Mackerel of fine quality have been recently taken in considerable quantities in the harbor at Pictou.

FATAL ACCIDENT.—An accident which resulted fatally, occurred at Salmon River, near Preston, on Tuesday last. A young Indian, 12 years of age, named Paul, accompanied by his sister, went in the woods to hunt for game. The gun which he carried getting entangled in the bushes, went off, and the contents lodged in the side of the unfortunate girl. She lingered but a few hours, when death put an end to her sufferings.—Recorder.

THE FRUIT GROWER'S EXHIBITION.—Competition will be open to persons from all parts of the Province on the following terms:—Every person (not a member of the Association) must pay \$1 on each collection of apples; and five cents on each dozen or half dozen of apples, &c.; also a small fee will be demanded, at the discretion of the Council, on entries of vegetables, &c.

There is in the possession of the Association a Silver Medal of the Royal Horticultural Society, London, awarded to this Association for the Collection of Fruits sent from the Exhibition held at Kentville in October, 1863, which will be open to competition, by the members of the Association only, for the best lots of the following six sorts of Apples, twelve of each sort, viz: Gravenstein, Yellow Bellefleur or Bishop's Pippin, Ribston Pippin, Baldwin, Nonpareil, and Rhode Island Greening.

The Silver Medal must be taken three years in succession before it will become the property of the successful competitor.
