The Italian Chancellor of the Exchequer in his financial statement to the Italian House of Parliament, frankly announced a great deficit of Parliament, frankly announced a great deficit of revenue against expenditure for the succeeding year, at the same time proposing fresh taxes to Year, at the same time proposing fresh taxes to make it up. The House, it is said, seemed to be under the necessity of making these new sacrifices in order to restore Italian credit.

AUSTRIA.

The Emperor, on opening the Hungarian Diet, seems to have given satisfaction to the people. His first object, he declared, was the unity of the empire, and, so far as the " autonomy" of Hungary could be maintained, consistent with this point and the satisfaction of other provinces, he promised that it should be kept up. The prospect of a reconciliation between Hungary and Austria certainly begins to look brighter.

BELGIUM.

The late King of the Belgians was buried with all imaginable funeral pomp. The facade of the Palace was draped with black studded with golden lions, and illuminated by numerous funeral lamps. The procession after passing through vast crowds of silent people in the streets of Brussels, reached Lacken. The coffin was lowered into the family vault, and good old King Leopold lay at rest by the side of the Queen who had preceded him to the grave. On Sunday the muffled bells laid aside their mourning, and clashed out merry peals in honour of the new Monarch Leopold II. His Majesty took the oath to support the constitution, before both Houses of Parliament, and by that assumed his kingly functions. He made a very feeling and judicious speech, promising to tollow in the footware of his father, and deviating that he footsteps of his father, and declaring that he would not interfere in party warfare.
