

BARRINGTON.—We regret to learn from the Rev. W. H. Richan the following sad tale of sorrow:—

"During the gale which swept across the Banks, on the 22nd ult., upwards of thirty men from different parts of this Township, who were engaged in the fishing business, are supposed to have found a watery grave. The schooner J. P. Nickerson, of Wood's Harbor, was seen dismasted, water-logged, and abandoned, and her crew, fifteen in number, are supposed to be lost. The schooner Wide Awake, of Shag Harbor, was also seen in a similar condition. Two of her crew were providentially on board of another vessel at the time of the gale and reached home in safety. The rest, seven in number, are supposed to be lost. The schooner Velox of Shag Harbor, with a crew of twelve men, has not been heard of since and serious fears are entertained for her safety. The land is filled with lamentation and woe. Many widows and fatherless children are left in a state of destitution, and many parents mourn the loss of their sons. May these heavy calamities be sanctified to the good of souls and the glory of God."

MEETING IN BEHALF OF THE SUFFERERS BY THE QUEBEC FIRE.—A meeting in accordance with a requisition from a number of the leading citizens, was called by His Worship on Monday afternoon, and was held in the City Court House, for the purpose of considering what aid could be rendered to the unfortunate sufferers by the terrible fire at Quebec.

His Worship the Mayor was called to the Chair, and Wm. Compton, Esq., appointed Secretary.

His Honor the Chief Justice moved the following resolution which was seconded by the Hon. Edward Kenny as follows:—

Whereas, This meeting having heard the sad account of the recent conflagration in Quebec, whereby so many thousands have been rendered homeless and destitute, recognise the claim upon the substantial sympathy and prompt assistance of their fellow-subjects, which this sudden and distressful event has occasioned, and regard an immediate effort to contribute to the relief of the suffering poor, deprived by this calamity of the means of sustenance and shelter, as a duty, in which the citizens of Halifax are called upon to take a part.

Therefore Resolved, That a Committee be formed to solicit subscriptions for the above purpose, and to transmit the amount received, to be distributed among the sufferers in such a manner as they may deem it advisable to direct.

A letter was read by A. M. Uniacke Esq., from the Lieutenant Governor Sir W. F. Williams, offering several suggestions for carrying out the object of the meeting, and enclosing a donation of \$250. He Mr. A. then moved the following resolution, which was seconded by John Tobin Esq., and unanimously adopted:—

Resolved, That the following gentlemen do constitute such Committee, with power to add to their number:—

A subscription list was then opened, and the following sums were subscribed:

The meeting then adjourned.

FATAL ACCIDENT.—We regret to learn that Mr. Wm. Noble, son of Robert Noble Esq., of this city, died on Saturday morning from the effects of injuries received by being thrown from a carriage on Friday afternoon. The deceased was driving through Hollis street, and when opposite Fishwick's Express office his carriage came in contact with an express wagon which was standing in the street, overturning the carriage and throwing Mr. Noble with considerable violence to the ground. It was at first supposed that he had only sustained a severe shock. It appears however, that he received some internal injuries, which as before stated, caused his death.

CARELESS PLAY.—A little boy in Lower Horton, a few days since shot an arrow into the eye of a little girl, and rather seriously hurt the eye; but it is hoped she will not sustain any permanent injury.

WOLFVILLE.—It was decided at the Annual School meeting to proceed forthwith with the new School-house. It was also agreed that \$380 should be raised towards the payment of Teachers, and \$20 for insuring the new building. Mr. Reuben Reed was elected Trustee in place of Mr. James Johnston, who had retired.

THE ANNUAL EXHIBITION of Fruit, Vegetables and Cereals took place yesterday at the Rink, in the Horticultural Society's Gardens of this city.

The Rink building was handsomely decorated, and the surroundings were put in excellent order.

The display of fruit was not in large quantities, but the specimens of grapes, apples and pears were very fine. Some grapes on the vines in pots were very handsome. The cabbage were very large. There were also very large handsome turnips, beets, and a variety of other roots, Indian corn and other cereals. The end of the Rink was very prettily formed into a rockery, having tropical plants arranged in different parts, together with several pretty appropriate statues. In the centre at the top the water gushed out and flowed down over steps forming a succession of waterfalls. The excellent taste of Mr. Hutton the superintendent, and Mr. Willis the Secretary of the Society, combined, the rink never looked so well before. The horticultural display, together with the music of the excellent band in the evening, it was a great treat to the large number of persons present.

OUR FORTS in the neighbourhood of Halifax are being supplied with new guns of immense size and power. They are described as follows:—The Woolwich nine-inch Twelve-ton Muzzle-Loading Gun. Its length is eleven feet, six inches, and circumference about 14 feet. It has six grooves running from breech to muzzle, with a half turn from left to right.

The projectiles used with these Guns, are solid shot, of two kinds; first, the steel pointed shot, which is headed with steel, and brought to a very fine point; second, the chilled shot, which is made of iron, but cooled by chemical process, and is nearly as hard as steel; third, the common shell, and fourth, common case. All these projectiles are cylindrically shaped.

It requires four men to put the projectiles in the bore; they are raised to the muzzle of the gun on a bearer, made for the purpose.

The service charges for these Guns are forty-three lbs of large grain powder.

They are being drawn to their place by a fine team of 12 horses.

The best means of securing peace is said to be to prepare for war. If this is the effect of these warlike movements we may be thankful.

THE FRUIT GROWERS' EXHIBITION at Somerset, West Cornwallis, on Thursday last, was attended by a large number of visitors, and was highly creditable and satisfactory to its promoters and the public generally. The day was most favourable. Nearly one thousand persons were admitted to the large Drill shed in which the Exhibition was held. The fruit and vegetables were fully equal to previous years. About sixty of the members of the Association and their guests dined together in the evening.

The list of prizes has not yet been published, but we understand that the medal of the London Society was awarded to Dr. Hamilton, and the Challenge Medal to Richard Starr, Esq. of Cornwallis.

SAD ACCIDENT.—On Tuesday evening Mrs. Boles aged about 80 years, and widow of the late Graham Boles Esq., went out of the room into the porch to get a drink of water, and as there was none in, she went to the spring; was missed but a few minutes, when she was found lying in a rhyvet, quite dead. It is thought she fell and had not strength to get up.

FLOUR.—The number of barrels of flour weighed in this city during the year ending the 30th Sept. was 120,000, of which 1099 turned out short of weight.

ESCAPED.—At the last sitting of the Supreme Court in Antigonishe, a Frenchman named Louis Pero, was sentenced to three years in the Provincial Penitentiary, with hard labor, for stealing a horse. On Thursday night a constable, from Antigonishe, arrived in this city with the condemned man in charge, but instead of conveying him to the Penitentiary or the Police Station, allowed him to go to a hotel, and the result was that on Friday morning the prisoner was not to be found, he having "skedaddled" during the night.
