The schooner Wide Awake, of Shag Harbor, was also seen in a similar condition. The schooner Velos of Shag Harbor, with a crew of twelve men, has not been heard of since and serious fears are entertained for her safety. The land is filled with lamentation and woe. Many widows and fatherless children are left in a state of destitution, and many parents mourn the loss of their sons.

May these heavy calamities be sanctified to the good of souls and the glory of God."
