

and there was one unanimous testimony to the peaceable disposition of the people.

Mr. Phillippo also appends a copy of a Memorial of the Baptist Missionaries which it was intended to send to Mr. Cardwell, the Colonial Secretary.

The first paragraph shows that the loyalty of the Baptist Missionaries has not only been unquestioned but acknowledged by every Governor of the island from the establishment of their mission in 1814 to the present time.

The second paragraph states that the said Bill might be appropriately designated the State Church and Roman Catholic Union Bill for the expulsion of all Dissenting Ministers from the island.

The third shows who the insurgents were. Among them

Were a class of persons who called themselves "Native Baptists," with whom your memorialists, as a body of missionaries in connection the Baptist Missionary Society in England, had no connection whatsoever—to whom, indeed, they were considered opposed as a consequence of the expressed conviction of the unfitness of the former for the work of the ministry from want of education, and, in some instances, from their character and superstitious practices, many of them having been excluded from the regular churches of the denomination for immorality and erroneous views of the doctrines and duties of the Gospel.

The fourth explains that "Out of upwards of thirty missionaries and fifty thousand of their people not more than two or three individuals, of which your memorialists have any knowledge have been even suspected of complicity with the rebels, and that these have been honourably acquitted."

We are glad, however, to learn from Mr. Phillippo's letter that the Bill has been rejected by the Legislature. He says:—"It is a matter of sincere congratulation to the Baptist missionaries as well as to all other dissenting bodies and liberal-minded men in the island, and should be to every one really interested in its general welfare, that a measure of such a character has been ignored by the good sense of an overwhelming majority of the house."

Under such circumstances it may be thought that there was no necessity for publishing the memorial. It, however, contains a vindication of the Baptist Missionaries from the "aspersions that have been so unreasonably and wantonly cast upon them in particular in the matter of the recent outrages; and they think it due to themselves, now that an opportunity has been forced upon them, thus to present it to the public both in this country and in England."

The editor of the Kingston Journal says in reference to the measures submitted to the Legislature:

The tendency of the bill to prevent rebellious proceedings will be to close all the newspaper offices in the colony. As with the press, so with the clergy, the sins of a few are to be visited upon many.

Certain pains and penalties are to be laid upon the free exercise of religious worship, which will strike at the freedom of the large and respectable bodies of Nonconformists, the Jews, and the Roman Catholics.

Let the constitution be amended by all means, if it is perceived that to its unsuitableness the rebellion is in part to be attributed; but do not destroy the constitution altogether; do not, above all, deprive Her Majesty's subjects in this island of their freedom of speech and freedom of religious worship.
