The French Cabinet made, yesterday, a further communication to the Cabinet at Berlin, demanding restoration of the French frontier as it existed in 1814.

A Berlin despatch of the 10th says there is great excitement there in consequence of the demands of France on Prussia.

M. Benedetti left Berlin for Paris on the evening of the 9th.

A Cronstadt despatch of the 10th says the United States squadron had a grand imperial and popular reception. The Czar visited the vessels at Cronstadt and took the chief officers to dinner with him.

After dinner the Emperor toasted the President of the United States and an uninterrupted friendship with Russia.

MISCELLANEOUS.

SUGAR.—The crop of sugar from the island of Jamaica, is expected to be about 30 per cent over last year. Great complaints are by the planters made at the lowness of the price.

WHEAT IN THE WEST.—The first bushel of wheat ever grown in Minnesota was raised in 1829; last year the yield was 10,000,000 bushels; and this year, with a good harvest, the crop is put down at 16,000,000 bushels.

THE HOLY LAND.—Letters from Jerusalem report an almost entire destruction of the scanty crops in the neighbourhood of that city and around Hebron by the ravage of locusts.

THE JERUSALEM.—One hundred and twelve thousand dollars were realized at Savannah, Georgia, a few days ago on a lot of shot and shell, broken cannon, field and siege pieces collected from Georgia battle-fields.
