LETTER FROM MR. THOMAS.

Meeting of the Association.—Henthada, June 19, 1866.—More than three months have passed since our Association met; but this is the first hour I have found in which to give an account of its meetings. The place of meeting, a few miles south of this city, was a most central one, and as no sickness then prevailed, an unusually large number was present.

Statistics.—Circular Letter.—During the three days of our meeting, upwards of sixty letters were read from churches and new interests; there were at least six sermons. There were early devotional meetings; subjects of interest to the people here were discussed, and plans laid for the future.

The past has been a year of consolidation, rather than of great outward growth. About one hundred were baptized; more than a hundred converts remain unbaptized. There were forty-five primary schools under instruction during a part of the year, and in addition to supporting, to a great extent, their own pastors, the churches contributed for benevolent purposes about nine hundred rupees.

After an appropriate introduction, the writer briefly dwells upon the following heads: 1. We ought to present a holy example before the heathen.
