"The Commissioners who proceeded to Brazil, visited first the cities of Para, Pernambuco, and Bahia. They met in each of these places several of the chief Merchants, and obtained from them information relating to the trade of the respective districts. The Commissioners arrived at Rio de Janerio, the capital of the Empire, on the 27th day of February, 1866, and as once made known to the G vernment of His Imperial Majesty the Emperor,-through the British Vice Consul,-their arrival, and the object of their visit.

His Excellency Senhor Saravia, the Brazillian Minister for Foreign affairs, was pleased to intimate to the Commissioners his readiness to confer with them upon the subject of their visit, and appointed a day on which to receive them.

The Commissioners accordingly waited upon His Excellency and explained fully the commercial position and prospects of the British North American Provinces, and the desire of the respective Colonial Governments to extend their commercial relations with Brazil. His M. expressed himself much interested in the several questions which were brought to his notice, intimated his readiness to do anything in his power calculated to promote the trade of the Empire, and requested that the Commissioners would furnish him with a memorandum of the propositions which had been discussed with him, in order that he might submit the same for the consideration of ministers, at a meeting of the Cabinet to be held next day. A memorandum was accordingly transmitted to His Excellency.
