The covered carriages are sourcely better, being so delapidated that they fail to keep out the dust, the wind, or the rain. If our legislators were compelled to trave! in them frequently, we might surely expect some better arrangement with the mail contractors. These gentlemen we think, too, are pursuing a mistaken policy. Better accommodation would induce more travelling, and ultimately become more profitable. In consequence of this deficiency, the beautiful country along the Annapolis Valley is victually shut out from the rest of Nova Scotia. It is far more available to the people of New B unswick who can cross the Bay twice a week, and enjoy all the luxuries of a splendid steamer.
