

to any Telegraphic Station in Great Britain and Ireland. For twenty words, including address and signature—£20 sterling. For each additional word—20s.

ESTIMATE OF REVENUE.

It is estimated that eight words a minute will easily be obtained through the Atlantic Cable, and the Directors say that there is reason to believe that at a tariff of anything like five shillings, (\$1 25) a word there would be more messages offered than the company could transmit.

This would give a dividend of from 16 to 20 per cent. to the shareholders. But in the event of the Company succeeding in raising the broken cable the two cables would produce a gross annual revenue of £1,080,000 equal to a dividend of 40 per cent.

LATEST DESPATCHES.

A despatch was received on Monday, which left London for New York on Friday last, to the following effect:—

Martial Law has been proclaimed in Lower Austria, and also in Venice, Prussia, and Wurtemberg.

A peace conference is to hold at Prague, the preliminaries agreed upon are as follows:—Austria is to withdraw from the German Confederation, and is to lose Venetia and her part of Schleswig-Holstein. Austria is also to pay ten millions of dollars to her adversaries as expenses of the war.

The bill for a renewal of the suspension of the writ of Habeas Corpus in Ireland was read a second time in the House of Commons last night.

Mr. Gladstone, in a speech, supported the Government, and warmly praised the treatment accorded to the Fenians by the American Government.

Mr. Maguire's resolution against the bill was negatived by a vote of 105 against 31.

The French Ambassador to England left for Vichy last night, by command, to see the Emperor.
