A FRACAS occurred on the railway cars between Moncton and Shediac, on Thursday last. A sailor holding a second class ticket went into a first class car and refused to leave.

Newfoundland.

A St. John's, Nfld., despatch of March 7, says:—"The greater portion of the sealing fleet including 10 steamers, which sailed from here on the 2nd inst., are now jammed in the ice off this port. The weather is very cold."

Canada.

Montreal, C. E., March 15.—125 regulars under the command of Captain Bolton, with a full supply of ammunition, left by train this morning for Champlain. A strong force of the Royal Artillery, with 8 field pieces, will be sent on frontier duty to-day.

Ottawa, March 15.—Rumours are in circulation of Fenian movements in the neighborhood of St. Albans, Vt. It is said that the Government is in possession of important information on the subject, and that the Hon. Mr. Blair, the only Cabinet Minister here, intends to leave for Montreal immediately.

A WILD CAT was recently killed in the 4th concession of Edwardsburgh, C. W., which measured 3 feet 9 inches in length.

A grand mass meeting was held on Sunday 2nd inst., at Quebec at St. Patrick's Church, when the officiating priest called the attention of his congregation to the misery existing among a class of the population who seldom if ever solicit charity, namely, the wives and children of men who left that city last fall to seek employment in the United States, and being unable to do so have not sent them any money.

The Quebec Gazette of the 8th inst., says:—"We understand that Michael Connolly, Esq., one of our city merchants, leaves to-day for Halifax, by way of Portland, forming one of the deputation with Captain Davidson, and Mr. Barbour, for the purpose of inspecting the boats which the Company are about buying, provided Messrs. Davidson and Barbour report favorably. Mr. Connolly is authorized to enter into negotiations for their purchase."

GOLD IN CANADA.—The gold discoveries at Madoc have caused vigilant search to be made for indications of the precious metal in other parts of Canada, and it has been discovered that it exists also in the township of Pittsburg, and at Loughborough. The sand from Madoc is said to be very rich. The Kingston Whig says a goldsmith in the city received a couple of days ago about a snuff-box full of common sand from Madoc, for which he paid \$10, and will be able to extract \$10 worth of pure gold from it. A single pinch of the sand contains twenty-five cents worth of the precious metal.

LATEST FROM EUROPE.

ENGLAND.—London, March 11.—Mr. Walpole, the Secretary of State for the Home Department, announced, in the House of Commons this morning, that the news from Ireland was good. Mr. Walpole also stated that the Government will not proclaim Martial Law in Ireland but will try Fenians by a special commission.

MARCH 12.—The Fenian bands in Ireland have all been dispersed, and the entire island is tranquil.

The Anglo-American Telegraph Company, and the original Atlantic Telegraph Company, held a meeting, in this city, yesterday, to consider the proposed reduction of tolls upon business transmitted over the Cable. Quite unexpected to the general public, the movement for a reduction failed in consequence of the refusal of the Atlantic Company to assent thereto.

MARCH 13.—The Banks at Amsterdam and Berlin have reduced the rate of discount, to 3 per cent.

There has been a great fall of snow in Ireland. A number of Fenians have been arrested in Limerick, and the prisoners, while on their way to the police barracks, were cheered by the people. Placards, emanating from the "I. F. B." have been posted in the streets of Clonmel and Borough towns in both Waterford and Tipperary counties, forbidding the people paying their rents.

The Government has just despatched four gunboats to Dublin, and they will be posted at different places in the River Liffey.

The Fenians have taken refuge from the British troops in the Wicklow mountains, a few miles south of Dublin, where they are perishing from the extremely cold weather.

It is stated that the European Powers have failed to agree on the Eastern Question. Russia demands additional concessions for the Christian subjects of the Sultan. Despatches from Constantinople state that the Turkish Government is determined to continue the war in Candia, and is preparing to send fresh battalions of troops to that island, under the command of Hassim Pacha.

MARCH 16.—The Servian question has been settled. Earl Derby says officially that the forces of the Sublime Porte are to leave Belgrade, the Servian capital city, and that that country will be practically free. The authority of the Turks there will be merely nominal.

Lord Lyons, ambassador of Great Britain at Constantinople, writes that the Turks will hasten reforms in favor of the Christians in Candia and elsewhere in her dominions.

Large bodies of troops have been sent to Liverpool to preserve the peace—an arising of the Irish in that city being apprehended. Large numbers of Fenians have been captured in many parts of Ireland, and many have been committed for high treason.

A general rising of the Fenians is expected to take place to-morrow—St. Patrick's Day. The Government, which is fully informed of the movements of the Fenians, is believed to be able to suppress any insurrection before it assumes very formidable proportions. Emigration to America from Cork for the past few days has been extremely large. Many of the emigrants have been recognized as being connected with the recent Fenian rising in Killarney. It is supposed that the unusual exodus was caused in part, at least, from the anticipated bloodshed in Ireland.

MARCH 17.—The Reform Bill, which is to be brought into Parliament by the Government to-morrow, will give the right of suffrage to rate-payers after two years residence, to men paying one pound yearly taxes, or having thirty pounds in a Saving's Bank, or fifty pounds in the funds and to all members of the learned professions and graduates of universities. The bill also provides for a fifteen pound franchise in the counties.

Liverpool, March 12.—The American Chamber of Commerce in this city gave a grand banquet to-night in honor of the heroes of the Atlantic cable, at which five gold medals were presented to Cyrus W. Field, Capt. Anderson, Mr. Canning, and Mr. Willoughby Smith. The entertainment was a splendid affair.

IRELAND.—Dublin, March 12.—Arrests of Fenians are being made in all parts of the country, and large quantities of arms have been seized by the police.

MARCH 14.—Two Fenian Head Centres named Buras and Rea have been arrested in Belfast.

MARCH 17.—Despatches from all parts of Ireland report that the country is quiet. Frequent arrests are made by the police in the disaffected districts.

France.—Paris, March 12.—The laborers employed in preparing the grounds, and buildings for the approaching exposition, have struck for higher wages.

MARCH 16.—The Monitor to-day in an official article, says Marshal Bazaine and the last of the French troops left Mexico on the 10th of March.

ITALY.—Florence, March 11.—The elections for members of the Italian Parliament have generally resulted in favor of the Government, which carries a majority of the electoral districts.

MARCH 14.—Nearly one half of the Italian elections are to be repealed. The result is exceedingly doubtful. Gen. Garibaldi is at the head of the Opposition party.

AUSTRIA.—Vienna, 13.—The Emperor Francis Joseph has given orders for strengthening the Austrian ports on the Servian frontier.

Despatches have been received here which state that the Viceroy of Egypt withholds the tribute which the Sublime Porte of Turkey levied on the people of that country, to meet the expense of crushing the insurrection of Candia.

MARCH 16.—Despatches have been received from the South which announce that the Turkish forces have been successful in a battle with the rebels at Thessaly.

PRUSSIA.—Berlin, 12.—Count Von Bismarck recommends a compromise between the several factions in the German Parliament in order to adopt a new constitution.

MARCH 13.—Herr Munchausen, the Premier of the Government of Hanover, under the late King, has challenged Count Von Bismarck for words uttered in debate in the German Parliament.

RUSSIA.—St. Petersburg, March 14.—The ports in the Baltic are closed by ice.

SPAIN.—Madrid, March 16.—In the general elections recently held throughout the kingdom, candidates favorable to the Government were mainly successful.
