LATEST FROM UNITED STATES.

NEW YORK, Oct. 1st.—Henry Hart, who has been charged with complicity in frauds on the Revenue amounting to \$20,000, voluntarily surrendered himself to the authorities yesterday, and was held in \$20,000 bail.

Jeff. Davis will be put on trial at the November term of the U. S. Circuit Court, at which Judge Chase is expected to preside. There are no indications that the proceedings against Davis will be discontinued. The President in conversation to day with an old friend from Tennessee reiterated his intention to resist any effort of Congress to remove him, pending the result of his trial on any articles of impeachment that may be preferred against him.

BOSTON, Oct. 1.—A fire this morning destroyed Geo. B. Roger's Linseed Oil Factory situated on Sargent's Wharf. Loss thirty thousand; insured. A fire at Westminister, Conn., Saturday destroyed Lathop & Co's, establishment. Loss twenty thousand; fully insured.

SAYANNAH, Sept. 30.—A man named Bradley, a Boston mulatto, who has been several times arrested by the military and civil authorities for swindling the negroes, and exciting them to disturbance, had an audience here of about 1000 negroes, mostly from the country to-day. In the course of his harangue against white men, and in favor of distribution of lands to negroes, he was interrupted and a melee occurred. A large force of police charged through the crowd. The military came to their aid and together they cleared the square. The muskets brought in by a large band of country negroes were taken by the police and turned over to the military.

A dispatch from Alexandria, Egypt, on the 4th, announces the arrival there of the steamer Quaker City with the American excursion party on board. The party are all well. Captain Duncan reports that the Quaker City will leave Alexandria on the 7th inst., and after calling at one or two points in the Mediterranean, will reach Gibraltar before the 27th inst., when she will sail direct for home.

LATEST FROM EUROPE.

ENGLAND.—London, Oct. 3.—Many Fenian convicts hitherto confined in English and Irish jails have been placed on board transports, and will be sent to Australia to serve out their sentence.

The City of Hamburg refuses to join in the Zollverein. The members of the Masonic Order, last night, gave a grand dinner at Gravesend to the officers of Admiral Farragut's flag ship Franklin now here.

Oct. 4.—It is said that Sir Augustus B. Baget the present British Minister at Florence, will be appointed Minister to the United States to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Sir Frederick Bruce. The report of the committee of Stockholders, appointed to visit America and examine the condition of the Atlantic and Great Western Railroad, is received and is highly satisfactory.

FRANCE AND AMERICA.—The French Government have authorized an Anglo French company to lay a telegraphic cable from Brest to the American continent. The Patrie says that the preliminary soundings, commenced four months ago, are complete. The cable will be laid from Brest to St. Pierre Miquelon, it having been ascertained that the bottom of the ocean along the line is favorable to the design. From St. Pierre it will go along the coast of New Brunswick and the shores of the States of Maine, New Hampshire, Massachusetts, and Connecticut. A direct line from Brest to New York would offer many difficulties, owing to the tremendous depth of some parts of the ocean, where the officers employed have been unable to find sounding, and where consequently immense quantities of cable might be sunk without result. The immersion of the cable now making in London is to begin in May next year, and the Great Eastern is to be employed to lay it. It is hoped that in July, 1868, at latest, France and the European continent will be in direct telegraphic communication with America.

SPAIN.—Madrid, Oct. 3.—General Leozundi has received his commission as Captain General for Cuba, and will immediately sail for Havana.

PRUSSIA.—Berlin, Oct. 2.—One hundred deputies in the North German Parliament have signed a formal protest against any infringement or disturbance of the long established Maritime privileges of these German States which border on the Baltic Sea.

ITALY.—The Telegrams from Italy relate mostly to GARIBALDI and his movements. It was said on the 2nd Inst., that a serious revolt had broken out in Rome, and that the Pope was obliged to fly to Civita Vecchia for safety. The Opinione a semi-official journal of Florence said that Rome would soon belong to Italy and that without a broken treaty.

A telegram from Florence on the 3rd, said the official despatches published to-day are silent in regard to Rome, but confirm the reports that a revolt has broken out in the Papal Province of Viterbo.

On the 4th, the following was received from London. While in prison at Alexandria Garibaldi persistently refused to give his parole not to engage in any hostile enterprise against the papal states, meanwhile the Italian Government hoping to allay the popular excitement caused by arrest, gave orders for the transfer of the prisoner to his home at Caprea, without insisting upon his parole. The General was accordingly taken to that island where he was apparently set at liberty. Soon after his arrival he suddenly disappeared from the island and succeeded in reaching the main land, but his movements had been carefully watch. He was again arrested and sent back to Caprea where he now remains under guard, a prisoner in his own house.

On the afternoon of the 4th, a report reached London the authenticity of which was not fully established that King Victoria Emanuel has made an appeal to the great powers of Europe against the September treaty which binds the Italian Government to prevent any intransaction of the temporal Dominion of the Pope.

Another telegram at midnight was a message from Florence announcing that the insurgents, in a secure position near Bagner and Viterbo, were attacked by the Papal forces. The fight resulted in the defeat of the attacking party, who withdrew hastily. The loss is unknown. The effect of this victory was very inspiring to the party of action. A public meeting of the friends of Garibaldi was held at Turin yesterday. Revolutionary speeches were made by many distinguished persons present, and the enthusiasm was unbounded. Meetings of a like character are in contemplation in various parts of Italy.

Garibaldi has issued a stirring address to his followers, which is published to-day all over Europe. He recites at length the grievances of Italy, and asks his countrymen to redress them. He appeals strongly to their patriotism, and urges all friends to march forthwith to Rome.

Deputations were arriving at Florence on Sunday last the 6th, with memorials from all the cities of the kingdom demanding that Rome be made the capital of Italy. The press throughout the country are urging subscriptions and raising money for the Garibaldi volunteers that have been wounded in the fights which have occurred in Viterbo.

It is reported in Paris that Napoleon has informed the Italian Government that it may occupy the Roman territory with its troops, but they must not enter the city of Rome.

Of course great alarm and agitation is prevailing at Rome in consequence of these political movements.

The presence of cholera adds to the distress in Rome. We learn by the last mail that from 40 to 60 cases a day are occurring there, the larger proportion of which are fatal. A correspondent in that city says, "It is impossible to describe the melancholy which is produced by the continual sound of the bell—the cholera bell. I do not fear for myself but there are moments when a cold perspiration comes over me."
