

FRANCE.—Paris, June 21.—The Emperor's Government has decided to make considerable reduction in the military forces of the empire.

ITALY.—Florence, June 21st.—Startling intelligence has been received here from Rome, despatches report that 200 armed men had thrown themselves into the city, it was supposed with the intention of proclaiming a republic, but the attempt failed and forty of the revolutioners are now in prison.

RUSSIA.—St. Petersburg, June 23.—His Majesty the Emperor has arrived from his visit to Paris.

AUSTRIA.—Vienna, 23.—Accounts received here state that a great feeling of opposition exists to a union of the different Provinces of Hungary.

MISCELLANEOUS.

Very satisfactory information has been received from Suez, about the passage of the Mecca pilgrims this season; 8847 had arrived, and, thanks to the care which had been exercised, and the sanitary regulations enforced, not a single death had occurred.

THE SULTAN OF TURKEY is purposing to visit England in July. It is stated that he will be attended by five hundred persons. The News of the World remarks upon the circumstance as follows:

It will be a wonderful sight to see the Sultan among us, even though he were to come with no companion Sovereigns to enliven Buckingham Palace with their presence. "He has never yet," it has been observed, "sat at table with any human being; nor has any human being ever seen him eat or drink. When he invites the Ambassadors to dine with him at Dalma Bashi, or at his kiosks on the Bosphorus, they are separated from his dining room by a high trellis of the same texture as the harem blinds. The Sultan will have to learn that the French and English people are not his vassals.

Letters from Bagdad say that town has, since the 17th March, been completely surrounded by water, in consequence of an inundation of the rivers Tigris and Euphrates. The whole of the country between Bagdad and Basorah is under water, and the crops have been completely destroyed.

A gentleman in Louisville, whose wife died of cholera, has sued the city for \$25,000, alleging that the disease was contracted because of the uncleanness and impurity of the city.

TO THE ELECTORS OF THE COUNTY OF HALIFAX.

GENTLEMEN,—In a few days the House of Assembly will be dissolved, and new elections in the course of the summer will take place for seats in the House of Commons in the Dominion of Canada; and as I have been nominated for one of those seats by my fellow citizens, at a large and influential meeting held at Temperance Hall for that purpose, I beg respectfully to solicit from you a renewal of that confidence with which you have honored me during three successive Provincial Parliaments.

I have now to address myself for the first time of the electors of the Eastern Division of this county. It will be seen by the Act of Union, that both divisions form one Constituency, and I feel I have some claim to their support, for, in the discharge of my public duty, in all that related to the local interests of the county, I have known no east or west.

During the twelve years that I have had the honor of a seat in the Legislature, the Province has enjoyed a remarkable degree of progressive prosperity. Wealth has rapidly increased, and the revenue has always been sufficient to provide for the public expenditure. These are the results of the combined action of your public men, in which I have had a humble share; and now a bright gleam of hope for the future has cheered the land by the passage of the Union Act and the Credit Bill, in the Imperial Parliament, to both of which Her Most Gracious Majesty has given her assent,—uniting these Provinces in the happy bonds of Union, and placing within their reach the means of constructing that great public work, "the Intercolonial Railway," for which they have so long and so earnestly labored.

I hope a just judgment of my past conduct will entitle me to the same measure of good will which has been extended to me during my twelve years of public life; and in the meantime, I again respectfully and earnestly solicit from you a continuance of that confidence which has always cheered me on in the discharge of my public duty.
