SATURDAY, April 13th.

The budget was taken up and several items passed.

The House in Committee on bills passed several.

The Halifax City Bill for the appointing a Stipendiary Magistrate occupied the remainder of the day.

MONDAY, April 15th.

Several Bills passed in Committee were read a third time and sent to the Legislative Council.

The County subdivision of the money granted for roads and bridges was moved by the Financial Secretary and passed. The same as last year.

Hon. Atty. General presented a petition relative to a school house. Referred to committee on education.

Hon. Provincial Secretary laid upon the table the catalogue of Acadia College. Referred to the same committee.

Mr. Archibald introduced a bill to provide for the inspection of coal oil and burning fluid, and to regulate the manufacture of the same.

Hon. Provincial Secretary laid on the table a return of the expenditure on the Pictou Railway in addition to the contract of Mr. Fleming.

Mr. S. Campbell presented two petitions respecting fish inspection.

LATEST FROM EUROPE.

ENGLAND.—London, April 8.—In the House of Commons this evening Mr. Lowe stated that startling news had been received in Berlin from Paris, and that the King of Prussia sent for Bismarck at two o'clock on Sunday morning.

The uncertainty in regard to the action of the Emperor Napoleon creates widespread distrust among business men, and great depression in consequence exists in financial circles here and in Paris.

April 9.—It is now known that the Emperor Napoleon, deeming the possession of Luxembourg indispensable to the military security of France, not long since commenced negotiating with the King of the Belgians for the purchase of the Grand Duchy, and incorporate it with the French Empire; but the tort of Luxembourg, which is one of the strongest fortified in Europe, was held by a Prussian garrison, and the Prussian Government backed by the whole of Germany, objects to the transfer of the Duchy to France. King Leopold has abstained from any further negotiations on the subject. The French Emperor insists that his proposition shall be carried out, and a treaty completed. The national pride of France has been deeply wounded. Meanwhile, while the dispute is pending, both Prussia and France are making military preparations. This state of affairs is the cause of the financial panic which exists in London, Paris, and all the commercial centres of Europe.

April 10.—The Spanish Government refuses to yield to the demands made by England, for indemnity and satisfaction in the case of the steamer "Tornado."

April 11.—The Grand Jury in the case of ex-Governor Eyre, of Jamaica, has ignored the indictment framed against that officer, growing out of his official conduct during the revolt in that island.

In the House of Lords this evening the Canadian Railway Bill was put upon its final passage and was successful.

The Princess of Wales is at the point of death. A surgical operation upon the bone of her knee is necessary to save her life, but she cannot endure the pain, and is too weak to take chloroform.

April 12.—The steamer which sailed for Cadiz early this week, took out the peremptory demand made by the British Government upon Spain for instant redress in the cases of the "Tornado" and the "Victoria." To this summons the Spanish Government has made an evasive reply in regard to the steamer "Tornado," but has given no answer whatever to the claims made in the case of the "Victoria."

Parliament has adjourned until the 29th inst., on account of the Easter Holidays.

The Debate on the Reform Bill occurred in the House of Commons this evening. Mr. Gladstone offered an amendment to the bill fixing the voting at £50. A long and very interesting debate on the amendment was followed by a decided vote for the Government the majority being 21.

April 13.—The Times of this morning has a congratulatory editorial article on the defeat of the Liberals, on the Reform Bill in the House of Commons last evening. The course pursued by Mr. Gladstone is greatly commended while that of the Liberal members who deserted their party is equally lauded. The Times thinks the Liberal Bolters hold the balance of power now and virtually control the Reform Bill.

The Queen of Denmark arrived in London the 18th ult., on a visit to her daughter the Princess of Wales.

Intelligence from Zanzibar leaves scarcely a hope that Dr. Livingstone is alive. By the latest advices dated the 7th of January we learn that Drs. Seward and Kirk had sailed in her Majesty's ship Wasp for Quiloa to make inquiries and obtain any further evidence.

April 13.—In case of war between France and Prussia, Bavaria and Baden will make common cause with Prussia.

Liverpool, April 11th.—The iron-clad war steamer, which hitherto has been stationed here, has gone to sea. It is supposed she will go to Cadiz in the interest of the Government relative to claims against Spain for the unlawful seizure of the ship Tornado.

IRELAND.—Dublin, April 9.—The trial of Fenian prisoners on the charge of high treason commenced yesterday, but to-day was postponed until the 22nd. The prisoner Massey has turned Queen's evidence.

FRANCE.—Paris, April 9.—The Marquis Demonties, Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs has made a very conciliatory speech which has had the effect to greatly lessening the panic Europe.

It is reported that the Prince Imperial of France has been compelled again to take to his bed. Fears are entertained that the surgical operations he has undergone may affect the use of one of his limbs.

The long talked of visit of the Empress of the French to Rome is again on the tapis. It is said, indeed, that a formal notification of her intention to make it in the course of the present month has been conveyed to the Pope's Nuncio, and that her son will accompany her.

BELGIUM.—Luxemburg, April 12.—The people of the city and province generally are decidedly opposed to the rule of the Grand Duchy being given to France.

PRUSSIA.—Berlin, April 11.—Count Bismarck has sent an energetic note to Paris, demanding of the Emperor Napoleon his reasons for arming. He says Prussia holds France responsible for the consequences of such a step, and asks for instant causes of warlike preparations.

Brussels, April 14.—It is reported that a proposition is now under consideration to make the Grand Duchy of Luxembourg neutral territory in order to avoid a war between France and Germany.

ITALY.—Florence, April 8.—The organization of the new Ministry has been completed by Baron Ruffice. The Cabinet is composed of prominent men of both political parties of the country.

The speech of the King of Italy at the opening of Parliament has produced a good impression on the public mind.

At a Consistory held in Rome on the 27th ult., the Pope appointed no fewer than 21 bishops, of whom four were French, one Hungarian, and 16 Italian.

It is fully expected that the Roman question will come under the consideration early in the sitting of the new Italian Parliament. From the tenor of a letter sent by General Garibaldi to his supporters urging them to be present at the early debates of the session, it is inferred that the general will take his seat in the chamber, and will bring on the Roman question by demanding that the resolution of the Italian Parliament making Rome the capital of Italy shall be carried into effect.

A telegram from Florence announces that the Pope has allowed the Italians to enter the Papal States to assist the Pontifical troops to suppress brigandage.

TURKEY.—Constantinople, April 10.—Edwd. Blacque, formerly Turkish Consul General at Naples, has been appointed Envoy of the Sublime Porte to the United States.

GREECE.—Athens, April 10.—The Sultan threatens to declare war against Greece, on account of the continuance of insurrectionary troubles on the Turkish frontier.

April 14.—The Cretan National Assembly has issued a circular declaring in favor of religious and political rights.
