A fatal accident occurred at Gaspereaux King's County, on Thursday last. A colored boy fell from the top of a loaded cart, and the wheel passing over his body, caused immediate death.

DROWNED.—Mr. Beriah Rice, a respectable man of about 24 years of age was drowned by the capsizing of a skiff in the Annapolis River about a mile and a half below Bridgetown, on Wednesday last.

William Barratt of Beaver Bank, was found drowned in one of the lakes in that vicinity on Wednesday last.

A young man named Peter Refuse was drowned in the LaHave River by the upsetting of a boat, one day last week.

The Antigonish Casinet gives an account of yet another.

A young lad named John McDougall, aged 14 years, son of Mr. James McDougall, Marshy Hope, was accidentally drowned on Monday last while pushing some scantling into the river at his father's sawmill.

ANOTHER STILL.—A child was missing for several days, and was last seen near the opening of the tank on the parade. It being supposed he had fallen in, the tank was pumped out on Wednesday last, by the steam fire engines, and the lifeless body was discovered there.

An inquest was held on the body, by Coroner Jennings, and the following verdict was returned: "That the deceased came to his death by drowning in the waters of a tank on the Parade on Tuesday, the 11th June 1867. The Jury believe that he came to his death accidentally, but suggest that in future the hatches of all the tanks in the city be locked, or so arranged that water can only be removed from them for fire purposes. The Jury regret that the hatches were allowed to remain in a state of decay so long; had they been repaired in proper time, the death of the child would not have taken place."

SERIOUS ACCIDENT.—A serious accident occurred at West River station yesterday. A ballast train was passing the station platform, when a man attempted to jump on to one of the platform cars, and falling on the track, the train passed over him. His right leg was broken and otherwise fearfully mangled, and his right

arm completely severed from his body above the elbow. The broken limbs were amputated by Drs. Mitchell and McGillivray, and some hopes are entertained of his recovery. The man was named Geo. Cameron and belonged to Tatamagouche, Colchester County.—Eastern Chron. 12th.

MELANCHOLY ACCIDENT.—Yesterday afternoon while the boat-car heavily laden with timber, was coming down the inclined plane, on the Shubenacadie Canal, towards Dartmouth, a lad, 11 years of age, son of Mr. Bishop, blacksmith, of Dartmouth, who was sitting on the front part of the car, unfortunately slipped off, and the wheels passed over his head, crushing it in a frightful manner, and killing him instantly. The poor little fellow is spoken of as having been a very promising lad.—Rec.

About a fortnight since, Mr. James Frederick caught at Margaret's Bay a large codfish, in the maw of which he found a small photograph of a lady.—Sun.

OUR NATAL DAY.—A notice in the Royal Gazette announces that the public offices and warehouses will be closed on Friday, the 21st inst., the anniversary of the settlement of Halifax, and that the day will be observed as a public holiday.

There is to be an excursion up the N. W. Arm to Downs's Gardens, and a Concert in the Horticultural Gardens in the evening. The City Council have placed \$400 in the hands of Aldermen Tobin, Ackhurst, Starr, Symons, Leahy, and Trenaman, for celebrating the day.

A YOUNG PICKPOCKET.—A boy named John Walsh was arrested on Saturday last, charged with taking from the pocket of a little boy named Tarpin, the sum of \$8.12. On Monday as no one appeared to prosecute, he was discharged.

PORPOISES.—On Saturday week, a school of porpoises numbering about 300 were seized at Dover, Margaret's Bay, by Mr. Charles Cleveland and his associates. On Monday he had 150 out of the seine, trying out the oil, which will prove a highly profitable haul.

ST. PAUL'S INDUSTRIAL SCHOOL FOR GIRLS. The Church Monitor gives an account of this excellent establishment recently commenced at No. 14 Tower Road. It states that there are now six inmates, and others are applying for admission. The services of a matron have been secured, and a committee of ladies have divided among themselves the duties incident to the conducting of such an establishment. The inmates are to be gathered while very young, from the dens of vice, and trained up in the ways of religion and industry.

Our list of Deaths contains the names of two sisters—daughters of Mr. David McPherson—Miss Jane McPherson, aged 22 years; who died on Friday last; and Mrs. Devlin, aged 29 years; who died on Sunday, but a few hours before the funeral of her sister. STABBING AFFRAY.—A disturbance occurred on Saturday afternoon, in a tavern in Upper Water street, kept by a man named Samuel Gaines, during which a sailor named Patrick McMullin, belonging to the ship Sabastopol, drew a knife and stabbed the proprietor, inflicting a severe wound. The police were called in, and the sailor taken into custody. A man named Conolly, who was assisting the police, was stabbed by one of McMullin's comrades, who was also arrested. The wound of Mr. Gaines is very serious, and it is doubtful if he will live. His deposition was taken on Saturday night.

GOLD AT HILLSBURG, DIGBY COUNTY.—The recent discovery of gold at Hillsburg, in the adjoining County of Digby, appears to have created no little excitement in that thriving village. We have been shown a letter from that place, to a gentleman in this town, dated May 5th, from which we make the following extract: "There is great excitement about the gold discoveries here. The company met yesterday, Mr. Hope got an answer from his son in Halifax, per telegraph yesterday, stating that the quartz sent there for analysis yielded 1 oz. 5 dwts. to the ton, which is even richer than the celebrated Waverly mines. The company talk of procuring a crushing machine forthwith, and of inviting the aid of capitalists abroad."—Yarmouth Tribune.


