NEWS SUMMARY.

The arrival of the Cunard Steamer Cuba last week with the English mails, brings particulars of European news, brief notices of which we had received from day to day by the Atlantic Telegraph.

The political horizon of the continent seems at present to be a good deal overclouded. The matter of greatest moment is a threatened interruption of peaceful relations between France and Prussia. The difference has grown out of the great success of the latter power in the late war with Austria, the result of which has been to add the whole of Northern Germany either to the integral dominions of Prussia or to her military jurisdic tion. This constitutes her in every respect a first rate power of Europe, not even second to France, which has hitherto been esteemed the first. As much as one third has been added to the losal area, and probably one third to the population of Prussia. Holland cannot afford to make the now powerful King of Prussia her enemy, and Prussia refuses to vacate the fortress which she occupies. The consequence is that friendly intercourse between France and Prussia has ceased, and both nations are apparently preparing to appeal to the arbitrament of arms-England and other powers are said to be using endeavours to adjust the matter, but as yet we believe, without much hope of success. It is fully believed however that our Government will pursue a strict neutrality, in case of an open rupture. The English Government is just now placed in an unpleasant position with Spain. Two English merchant vessels, the Queen Victoria and the Tornado have been captured on the high seas by Spanish armed vessels, under some frivolous pretext of infraction o Spanish laws, sent into port, their crews imprisoned or dispersed and the vessels and cargoes condemned. Demand of reparation was immediately made by the British Government and negociations have been pending for a year past, without effect, in consequence of the dishonest quibbling and subterfuges of the Spanish Ministry-we see it stated that the case of the Queen Victoria has been at last satisfactorily adjusted, but as no satisfaction can be had in the case of the Ternado, our government have dispatched several ships ot war to the Spanish coast to demand immediate reparation. Sir Richard Mundy, the diate reparation. Sir Richard Mundy, the Admiral who was expected this week, to suc-ceed Sir James Hope on this station, has been appointed to command the squadron sent to appointed to command the Spain, and the departure of our present Admiral is consequently delayed. The latest telegrams received since the above was in print, indicate more pacific prospects on the continent of Europe.




