NEWS SUMMARY.

The arrival of the Cunard Steamer Cuba last week with the English mails, brings particulars of European news, brief notices of which we had received from day to day by the Atlantic Telegraph.

The political horizon of the continent seems at present to be a good deal overclouded. The matter of greatest moment is a threatened interruption of peaceful relations between France and Prussia.

INDUSTRIAL EXHIBITION MEETING.—This meeting was held on Wednesday evening at Temperance Hall, according to previous announcement.

His Excellency the Lieut. Governor presided, and the body of the Hall, though not crowded, was well filled with a large and intelligent audience.

His Worship the Mayor briefly stated the object of the meeting, which was to take into consideration the best means of affording assistance to the Board of Agriculture in holding a Provincial Industrial Exhibition in 1868.

His Excellency in a brief speech explained the benefits to be derived from such Exhibitions, after which the meeting was addressed by the following gentlemen:—Hon. Mr. McFarlane, Chairman of the Board of Agriculture, His Lordship the Chief Justice, Hon. Provincial Secretary, A. M. Uniacke, Esq., John McCulloch, Esq., P. C. Hill, Esq., Rev. Dr. Forrester, P. Lynch, Esq., A. McKinlay, Esq., and John D. Nash, Esq.

Resolutions were passed pledging the citizens of Halifax to do all in their power to aid the Exhibition, and a large committee composed of all classes appointed, with power to add to their number.

A vote of thanks to His Excellency was moved by the Mayor, seconded by Joseph Northup, Esq., and passed unanimously.

Several of the speeches delivered were of a highly interesting character, and were enthusiastically received.—Col.

A sacred concert was given at St. Mary's Cathedral, on Tuesday, the 23rd, in aid of the Building Fund of St. Joseph's Church, the amount realized by it was £70.

It is said by the Reporter that a clue has been found to at least some of the recent fires.

The old cable across the Strait of Canso was broken by ice on Monday last. The Telegraph Company was most fortunate in laying a new cable in January last, otherwise telegraph communication with Cape Breton, Newfoundland and Europe would be entirely suspended.

On Wednesday last the Archbishop of Halifax visited the French war ships in harbor, and was received with a salute of 13 guns.

The French Admiral Baron de la Ronciere le Noury returned on Wednesday, from Canada via Windsor, and soon after his arrival the iron-clad fleet left direct for France.

ROBBERY.—A colored man named Bauld, and his wife, were, on Saturday last, examined before Mr. Justice Shields, upon a charge of having burglariously entered the house of a woman named O'Keilly, in Dartmouth, and stolen therefrom money and valuables to the amount of \$200. Both man and wife were committed for trial before the Supreme Court.

SUPREME COURT.—The Grand Jury have found true bills against George Parsons for the murder of Mrs. McCarthy; Michael Bradley, a soldier, for rape; and against N. Warner, for unnatural crime, also against Eugene Donohoe and Charles Rafferty, (Artillerymen,) for stealing a chest of wearing apparel, &c. belonging to Mr. Alex. Deuchar, against the same parties for robbing the residence of Alderman McCulloch in October last, and against James Chapman for stealing a quantity of gold and quicksilver from the premises of the Oldham and Boston Gold Mining Company at Oldham on the 16th inst.—These parties were arraigned and pleaded not guilty. The trial of the Artillerymen was set down for Wednesday in event of anything occurring to prevent the trial of Parsons (previously set down for that day) coming on, and of Chapman for Friday. The Grand Jury having ignored the bills against James Burns for arson, and Mary Carvery for concealing the birth of her child, they were discharged.

On Monday Peter McGill and John Hinch were placed on trial before Judge DesBarres for breaking into the office of Mr. James McDaniel in January last, and stealing several articles—Hinch was discharged at an early stage of the trial, there being no evidence against him. The trial of McGill was proceeded with, and at 5 o'clock the jury retired to their room. After two hours deliberation they returned a verdict of "Guilty."

The Public Meeting for nominating the Union Candidates was to be held last evening.

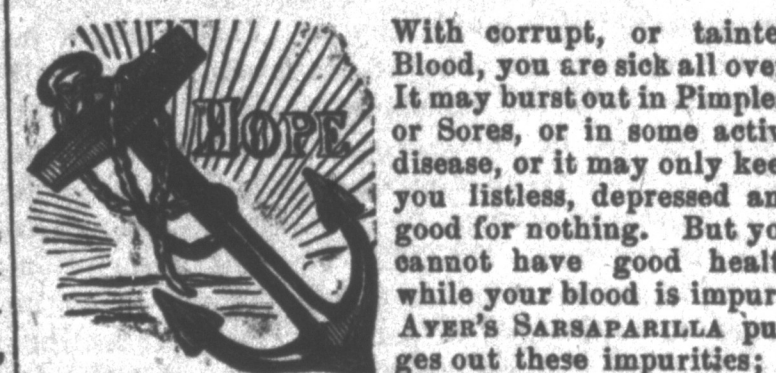
