To the Electors of the County of Annapolis.

GENTLEMEN,—HAVING been nominated at a large and influential meeting of the Electors of the County as a Candidate for the General Parliament at Ottawa, I beg now most respectfully to solicit your suffrages at the ensuing Election.

For the eight years during which I have been honored by your generous confidence and support, I have endeavored to study and advance your interests, while I have had some humble share in promoting the prosperity of the country.

In the discharge of the varied duties of public life, I do not for a moment flatter myself that I have always obtained your unqualified approval, but be assured that I have been actuated by a desire to meet your wishes, and promote the general good.

In supporting the scheme for an Union of the Colonies I have been called upon on several occasions to assume grave responsibilities, when, for the time being, I was somewhat in doubt about your views upon this great question, and only felt myself justified in voting as I did under the strongest conviction that the general good would be greatly subserved by the consummation of the scheme proposed.

I have steadily, and to the best of my ability advocated the claims of the western part of the Province to a participation in the advantages of Railway communication with the Capital of the Province; and hope I may claim some share of the credit due for the boon about to be conferred upon the people of the west in connection with the Windsor and Annapolis Railway, which is now in course of construction, and will undoubtedly be finished on or before the end of 1869.

I need scarcely remind you of the strenuous efforts made in the Legislature by the opponents of the Government to obstruct and defeat this undertaking from its inception down to the end of the last session of the Assembly; nor need I refer to the unhandsome opposition which it has encountered from the press in their interest, not excepting the local paper of the County; which strangely enough has been among the most bitter of all its opponents; for these facts are patent to all, and will doubt not be fully appreciated at the proper time; moreover it is known that one at least of those likely to contest the constituency with my colleagues voted against this project in the Legislature, and it is believed that the two candidates likely to be associated with him in the contest are equally hostile to the enterprise in question.

Fortunately the most determined efforts of this extraordinary combination could not bar you from the privileges which you are so secure at so early a day.

I need scarcely say to you that I sought not the nomination so handsomely conferred upon me, but that on the contrary, I should have been only too happy to have escaped from the excruciating and turmoil of an exciting election contest by myself nominating for the honorable position in question one deservedly popular in the County, and one perchance better qualified to serve you in the General Parliament than myself, and only consented to accept the nomination myself, when it was found that the objections of the valued friend referred to could not be overcome.

Having thus placed myself in your hands, permit me again to solicit your hearty and generous support, and be assured that no effort of mine shall be spared in the way of securing a triumph for "Union," and making it what I sincerely believe it is destined with proper management to be, an inestimable blessing to all concerned.

Although a candidate for the General Parliament, I shall not cease to feel a lively interest in local affairs, and acting in happy concert with my colleagues Messrs. Whitman and Foster, the candidates for the Local Legislature, trust it may be in my power still to serve you, to some extent at least, and beg therefore in conclusion to ask for these my colleagues the same measure of support accorded to myself.

A Connecticut genius has manufactured a knitting machine that will knit fifty pair of stockings per day, and is so constructed that the stitch can be changed from a rib to a plain stitch almost instantly. There are seventy-five needles in the machine, which will knit sixty turns of an ordinary sized stocking a minute, or 4,500 stitches a minute. This is at the rate of 270,000 stitches an hour. Its weight is about twenty pounds. It knit cotton, silk, worsted, or any light material equally as well as woolen. It knits also the whole stocking, including the heel. One of these machines, at a recent trial, knit 1,500 yards of stockinet without dropping a stitch or breaking a needle.

STREET CARS ON SUNDAY.—At a meeting of the City Council on Friday last, a petition was presented against the running of the Street Cars on Sundays. The official report tells us the petition was 35 feet long, and signed by His Lordship the Bishop of Nova Scotia and 1,454 others. As the petition in favor of the cars running on Sundays had only 700 signatures, we presume this settles the question.—Chron.

A NEW CUNARD STEAMER.—A splendid addition has been made to the fleet of Messrs. Cunard, the fine screw steamship Russia having lately arrived in the Mersey, from the Clyde, where she was built by Messrs. James and George Thompson. She is a very handsome, as well as very strong vessel, 370 feet in length over all; beam, 48 feet; depth of hold 29 feet; tonnage, 3100. She is propelled by a screw fan of great power, driven by engines capable of working up to over 8000 horse power. On her trial trip the Russia gave great satisfaction to the Admiralty officials, running over the Admiralty measuring mile both with and against the tide, and giving a mean speed of fully 15 knots per hour. The Russia is, we believe, the largest screw steamer in the possession of the Cunard Company, and is one of the most magnificent of that wonderful sisterhood of vessels. She has ample accommodation for 300 first-class passengers.

SAD ACCIDENT.—A sad accident, and one which it is feared will be attended with fatal consequences, occurred on the Winkworth Road, on Monday last. It appears that Robie McLatchy having killed a calf in the morning, left the head and skin hanging in the barn, whither the cow, it is supposed, went in search of her offspring, and discovering the remains, commenced bellowing and moaning over them. Mrs. McL. hearing the noise and wishing to ascertain the cause, thoughtlessly entered the barn, whereupon the cow became infuriated and rushing upon her, knocked her down, tramping her with her hoofs, and inflicting very serious if not fatal wounds with her horns. It assistance had not been speedily rendered, the cow would have killed her on the spot.—Windsor Mail.
