A Connecticut genius has manufactured a knitting machine that will knit fifty pair of stockings per day, and is so constructed that the stitch can be changed from a rib to a plain stitch almost instantly. There are seventy five needles in the machine, which will knit sixty. turns of an ordinary sized stocking a minute, or 4,500 stitches a minute. This is at the rate of 270,000 stirches an hour ! Its, weight is about twenty pounds. It knit cotton, silk, worsted or any light material equally as well as woollen, It knits also the whole stocking, including the heel. One of these machines, at a recent trial, knit, 1,500 yards of stockinet without dropping a stich or breaking a needle.
