March 10.—The Band of Fenians, previously reported to have taken possession of the barracks at Kiltan, in Kildare, have been dispersed by the troops.

FRANCE.—Paris, March 4.—The Government has commenced legal proceedings against M. Emile de Girardin, for a leading editorial in his journal boldly criticising the policy of the Emperor.

March 10.—The *Moniteur* states that by this time all the French troops must have left Mexico, and that the departure of the Emperor Maximilian from Vera Cruz was to have taken place on the 8th of March.

PRUSSIA.—Berlin, March 4.—Count Bismarck to-day laid before the North German Parliament the draft of a new constitution for the Confederation of the North German States.

AUSTRIA.—Vienna, March 5th.—The Eastern Question is becoming more complicated. Despatches have been received from the South which indicate that a general rising of the Christians throughout Turkey is feared.

The motto of the Austrian Empire is initialled, 'A. E. I. O. U.:' the wording is 'Austria erit in orbis ultima—Austria will be the last in the world.' Those words were first used centuries ago by the Emperor Frederick III.; but it has often been remarked that they are capable of more meanings than one.

SPAIN.—Madrid, March 10.—A Royal Proclamation announces the termination of Martial law in Spain.

JAMAICA.—Significant.—Sir J. P. Grant has appointed Mr. Benjamin Reid, a black man, who was formerly a slave on the Chesterfield estate, to be a member of the road and municipal board of the district of Vere.

From that time until the close of her life, she was a consistent member. Although the cares of a young family often kept her from the house of God, her heart was with His people. About three years since, God in His wisdom took from her a lovely boy of two years, the pride of a mother's heart. From that time her health has been failing. 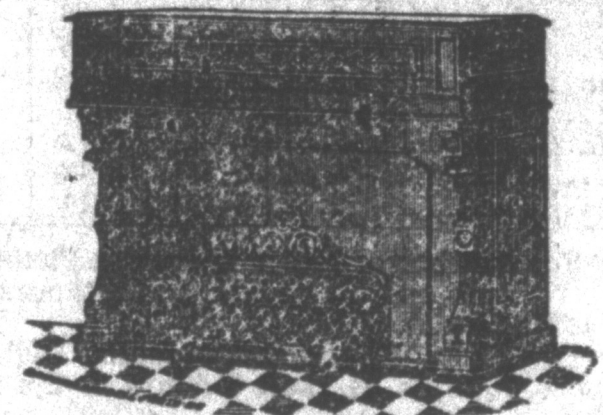
