

whole fatherland would be completed—the balance of power between Austria and Prussia preserved—and the peace of Europe additionally guaranteed.

THE GARIBALDIAN REVOLT.

The telegrams of the past week indicate that a large proportion of the Italian people sympathize with Garibaldi, and are rising in answer to his address, and that it will not be so easy a matter for the Government of that country to suppress the revolution or protect the Pope in his possession of Rome.

The following are the despatches: London, Oct. 7.—Reports are hourly received at Florence from the South, showing that Revolutionary Volunteers are invading Roman territory on all sides. Yesterday detachments of troops were out from Rome to meet the invaders in Frasinone, a Province lying south east of the city; a fight took place between them and the Garibaldians near the Abuschesse frontier. The Papal troops were again defeated and compelled to fall back on Rome.

Florence, Oct. 8.—The officers of the Papal forces engaged at Bagnar claim that they gained a victory in that battle. They claim that 70 of the enemy were wounded and 110 made prisoners.

The volunteers of Garibaldi were marching upon Rome from every direction. The Florence press urges the Government to intercept them, and surround the city with National troops.

A report has gained currency that the American Minister, Hon. George P. March, had demanded the release of Garibaldi on the ground that he was a citizen of the United States. This is denied; but it is true Mr. March had asked the Government to show clemency to the distinguished prisoner.

Garibaldi has issued an address denouncing Ratzani, and urging his followers to carry on the war for the possession of Rome.

Oct. 10.—There was another battle yesterday between the Garibaldians and Papal forces near Montalieta. It is reported that the invaders were defeated, but reliable accounts of the repulse is received. Men of the party of action here assert the insurrection will soon break out in the city of Rome itself. They say preparations for this purpose are complete, and the leaders of the movement in Rome are acting in concert with the invaders in Viterbo and elsewhere.

London, Oct. 11.—The "Presse" says the Pope is confident of the ability of his force to successfully resist the struggling parties of the invaders. He greatly fears that the Italian Government will yield to the popular outcry and order its troops concentrated upon the Papal frontier to march upon Rome and occupy the city. The Standard of to-day published a letter which it declares genuine addressed by the Emperor to the Marquis De Lavallette, his Minister of the interior and written in August 1866. In this letter the Emperor explicitly denies that he had any desire to interfere or profit by the Reconstruction of Germany.

The insurgent and invading parties in the Province of Viterbo have concentrated at Formose, where they have thrown up entrenchments. Many other places in the Roman territory have been occupied by Garibaldians. Several detachments of Pontifical troops have been sent out to dislodge them, and the Garrison of Rome is very small at present. A strong Papal force had left Rome to prevent a junction of Menante with Garibaldi and the parties under his command with the insurgents at Formose. The plan of the Garibaldian leaders seems to be to draw the soldiers of the Pope away from Rome and thus give their party in that city an opportunity to rise.

Ghent, Oct. 11th.—A well informed Journal of this city says that Cardinal Antonelli addressed a note to the European powers in which he charges the Italian Government with actual concurrence in the revolutionary movements against Rome.

London, Oct. 12.—Despatches this evening from Paris state that affairs in Italy are very grave. The general belief is that the whole nation will follow Garibaldi in his efforts to restore Rome to Italy. The King of Italy will soon pass the Roman frontier and proclaim Rome as part of the kingdom.

Florence, Oct. 13.—Garibaldi has named his son Mariotti General of the Revolutionary forces engaged in the movement against Rome. It is reported that bands of invaders have been driven across the frontier by Papal troops, and disarmed by the National forces.

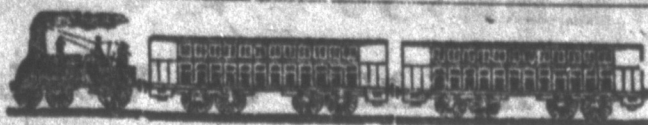
