An amendment was made to the constitution of the Convention defining more clearly who should be eligible for membership. At the close of the 4th article of the constitution, the following words were added, "All persons referred to above shall be members of Baptist churches, in good standing."

We were much gratified to find that the interest of the people continued without diminution to the last hour of the Convention. Some few had previously asked leave to retire, but a large congregation of delegates and friends remained to the close.

Quite a number of new friendships were formed on this occasion, and old ones revived which gives fresh stimulus to combined christian effort. Another host of pleasant remembrances is supplied by this anniversary. Not the least of which was the ride home, by night, in company with a number of friends than whom we never expect to find any more agreeable in this world.

NEWS SUMMARY.

The telegrams by way of New York give information of a serious riot having occurred in Montreal, on the nomination day of the Candidates proposed as members of Parliament and for the Provincial Legislature. It is said that a number of persons were injured and one killed—we must wait however for more particular accounts, hoping that those received have been exaggerated. The city of Montreal has of late years been badly celebrated for its riots, but it is more than probable that on the present occasion a large amount of Fenian element has been at the bottom of the outrage, as the brotherhood are said to be pretty numerous there.

The last mails from England which arrived on Friday last bring no European news of any moment. There appears to be a glut of Gold in the Bank of England, and discount is as low as two per cent. Still there is little or no activity in speculation. The Emperors of France and Austria have been together in Conference for some time at Salzburg in South Germany. Conjecture is busy as regards the objects of this meeting—various rumours have gone abroad, but it is believed that nothing will be done to endanger the peace of Europe.

General Intelligence.

Domestic.

The Prize Firing at Bedford has occupied much attention during the past week. The various competitions closed on Friday last. About 4 o'clock in the afternoon of that day His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor came upon the ground, and after delivering to the large number of contestants and visitors present a few appropriate remarks, presented the prizes to the successful competitors.

Upon this part of the proceedings the Chronicle remarks:

"As each lucky marksman came forward to receive the prize he had won, loud cheers greeted

him from the ranks of his brother competitors. The scene was a most pleasing one, particularly as it was graced by the presence of a number of ladies, who appeared interested in the presentation.

Looking back at the competition as a whole, it cannot be denied that the Halifax men this year have proved themselves foemen worthy of the countrymen's steel. Nearly all the principal prizes have been won by the Metropolitans, together with a large number of the minor ones. Let not, however, our country friends be discouraged. Let patient, steady practice be their rule, and next year may probably show a result more favorable to them. The shooting throughout has been remarkably good—the scores at some of the ranges, we believe, not having been beaten at any rifle contest, showing conclusively that Nova Scotians can excel in whatever they undertake."

At the request of numerous intending exhibitors, the exhibition of the Nova Scotia Dog, Pigeon, and Poultry Club has been postponed until the 1st of October. Further particulars will be duly announced.

On Thursday last a man named Rogers, working on the Lower Horton section of the Annapolis Railway, was killed by the falling of a sand bank.

A "brick" of gold weighing 712 ounces, from the Sherbrooke district, was on exhibition at the office of Messrs. Huse and Lowell on Saturday.

A woman named Mrs. Shannahan, was arrested on Saturday for having stolen a quantity of clothing, etc., the property of the Orphan Asylum and other persons. The articles were taken from the lines. The goods were found in possession of the prisoner. She is sentenced to three terms of 90 days in the city prison.

On Thursday last as the steamer Mimas was leaving the North Ferry wharf for Sackville, a woman with a child in her arms fell overboard. After remaining in the water for some time they were rescued.

ROBBERY.—On Friday night the premises occupied by Mr. Fishwick as an Express office were entered through a pane of glass which had previously been broken, and a cash box containing about \$108 in money, together with jewelry to the value of \$20, carried away. On Saturday Policeman Power arrested a man named Crawford, driver in Fishwick's employ, on suspicion of committing the robbery, and subsequently recovered the jewelry, which was found hidden in the company's stable.

The man has since confessed that he committed the robbery, and says that after counting the money and putting it in his pocket, he threw the box into the harbor. He is committed for trial.

Thos. Davis who escaped with three others from the City Prison one day last week, was recaptured on Saturday afternoon last and consigned to his old quarters.
