

Quebec.

Parliament of the Province of Quebec is prorogued until the 4th of November.

The troop ship Himalaya, which sailed on the 4th, from Malta on the 4th Inst for Quebec is reported detained at Quarantine Island, from the prevalence of Asiatic cholera.

A Montreal special of the 17th says Spellman Distillery was fired and totally destroyed. Loss 100,000 dollars. One fireman was killed and another mortally injured by falling walls of the building.

A birth, a death, and a marriage took place on board the steamship Serapis, on her last trip from Liverpool to Quebec. The passengers were soldiers and their families.

LATEST FROM UNITED STATES.

UNITED STATES AND RUSSIA.—A Telegram from New York, Sep. 19th, states that:—“A St. Petersburg letter of the 28th to the Paul “Gazette” mentions rumors of an alliance between Russia and the United States, in view of certain contingencies which it is supposed may lead to war.”

BOSTON, Sep. 19.—Sir Frederick Bruce, British Minister at Washington, died suddenly at Tremont House, in this city, and 2 o'clock this morning of diphtheria. He was first attacked some time last week while at Rhode Island, finding his disease growing worse decided yesterday to visit Boston for medical aid.

MEXICO.—New York, Sept. 23.—A special from the city of Mexico, Sept. 7th, says the remains of Maximilian had arrived there from Querato, and there was every probability that they would be delivered to Admiral Tegtöf.

LATEST FROM EUROPE.

ENGLAND.—London 19.—Regular weekly returns of the Bank of England, published last evening, show that the bullion in the vaults has increased £150,000 sterling, since the last report.

Contradictory stories in regard to the war in Crete still prevail, and the Greeks deny that the Turks have been successful in the battle with the Cretans.

SEPT. 22.—The regular session of the Fensian Anlican Synod commences this week, at the Palace at Lambeth. It is understood that the reporters of the newspaper press will not be permitted to be present at the deliberations of the Synod.

IRELAND.—Belfast Sept. 17.—A resident of this city supposed to have been a secret director of the Fenian organization in this section of Ireland died recently and was buried to day.

RIOT AT MANCHESTER, G. B.—We have by Telegraph the following account of a serious riot which occurred Sept. 17th.—Colonel Kelly, known to be one of the Fenian leaders in the outbreak in Ireland was discovered by the Police to be stopping in this city and was to day arrested at his lodgings.

Sept. 19th.—Quite a serious Fenian riot occurred in the city of Manchester to-day, resulting in the killing and wounding of several persons. While a strong Police escort were conducting the Fenian Kelly, recently arrested in that city, and Deasy, from the jail to the Railway Depot preparatory to their removal to Dublin for trial, they were attacked by a mob of people armed with clubs, stones and fire arms.

obliged to give way. The prisoners were rescued from the mob and carried off in triumph. The city is now quiet. One policeman was killed and several others wounded. Many of the rioters were also badly injured.

Sept. 20th.—Several suspected parties were arrested during the night; some were taken out of their beds. It is reported that Kelly was recaptured, but it is not confirmed, every means are being used to prevent further disturbance.

Everything is quiet. The rioters appear to be satisfied with their success, and there have been no more disturbances. No traces of the rescued prisoners Kelly and Dessey have been discovered, and it is thought they have by this time succeeded in making their escape from the city.

DENMARK.—Copenhagen, Sept. 22.—Strong doubts are entertained here in official quarters of the success of the Danish Cabinet in its negotiation with Prussia for the retrocession of the Danish Province of Schleswig.

ITALY.—Florence, Sept. 22.—Gen. Garibaldi has issued a stirring address, announcing that the time has now come to overthrow tyranny of the Pope, and restore Rome to Italy, and give the Eternal city its ancient supremacy as the capital of the Italian nation.

A proclamation has also been promulgated by King Victor Emanuel warning all Italians against taking part in, or aiding or abetting any revolutionary movement against Rome, which is denounced as a crime, against the laws of Italy and Nations.

The proclamation concludes with a trust that the Government will not fail to visit with vigorous punishment all persons found engaged in illegal hostility to the Papal authorities.

A despatch from Rome states that the Pope has publicly denounced the proposed sale of church land in Italy, and declared the decree of the Italian Government to that effect, null and void.

PRUSSIA.—Berlin, Sept. 17.—King William will visit Rostadt during the present week, on invitation of Grand Duke of Baden, who has requested his Majesty to hold a review of the military forces of the Grand Duchy.

The cabinets of Berlin and Vienna are engaged in negotiating a commercial treaty which will relieve the trade between Germany and Austria from many restrictions, and will tend to make the business relations of the two countries more satisfactory than they have been at any time since the late war.
