NEWS SUMMARY.

It appears that the telegram from London received here on the 14th Inst., stating that the Bill before Parliament for a Union of the British Provinces 'only embraced the two Canadas' was largely inaccurate. The telegram sent from London said, "only embraces the two Canadas, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick."

Letters were received by the last mail, giving information of the position in which the question stood at the time of the steamer leaving England. We have been permitted to make an extract from one received by a friend, although not intended for publication, which will shew somewhat the changes that will be made by the Union Act.

The Quebec scheme is a good deal modified in our favor. The Canadians consent to give up the name of their country,—that is to say, to call Lower Canada "The Province of Quebec," Upper Canada "The Province of Ontario," so that the whole may be called CANADA.

As I write, the weather is like June in Nova Scotia, the grass is as green as midsummer, the frost don't affect leaves and herbs, as with us. We want, if possible, to get the Intercolonial Railway put under contract this summer.

Our Provincial Legislature is expected to meet for despatch of business on Saturday, the 16th of March, by which time it is supposed the Delegates will have arrived and be prepared to make their report to Parliament.

General Intelligence.

Domestic.

The Berwick Star states that on one night recently, three dogs killed twenty-one sheep in the yard of Mr. J. Parker, Aylesford.

From the same paper we learn that a house on Union-square, Cornwallis, occupied by Mr. McMann, was destroyed by fire on the 18th inst. caused by a defective stove-pipe.

A sailor belonging to a schooner lying at Roche's wharf, whilst going on board his vessel on Friday evening last, slipped and fell into the water. A woman who lived near by, heard his cries, and ran to render assistance, in doing which she likewise fell overboard. The cries of both were heard and timely interference prevented them from drowning.—Chron.

NARROW ESCAPE.—We learn from the Amherst Gazette that the Wesleyan College building at Sackville, had a very narrow escape from being burned. The discoverer, who was the only inmate of the building at the time, as it was during tea hour, had not been confined by illness for ten years until that day. It must have been caused by a spark falling through a knot-hole in the floor, near a stove, in the room of a student. It was through great difficulty and perseverance that its location was ascertained, although it had spread nearly across the room beneath the floor. Dr. Pickard, who labored most assiduously, was carried out three times, after having been nearly suffocated by smoke, each time insisting that "it must be found."

The same paper notices several other fires of a more or less disastrous character. One of a small house belonging to Mr. Beharrel, Amherst Head. Loss \$400. A second, of the shop of T. S. Moore harness maker, which was extinguished before making much headway; and a third of the shop of Mr. Sutherland, tailor, also soon extinguished.

The Bridgetown Free Press has suspended publication for a few weeks.

The special Sessions of Antigonishe, have refused to grant licences for the sale of intoxicating liquors.

A blacksmith's forge at Antigonishe, owned by Mr. R. Crockett, was destroyed by fire on Sunday before last.

A grist mill at Middle Musquodoboit, owned by Mr. James Guild, was destroyed by fire on Tuesday night.

PARIS EXHIBITION.—The total number of Nova Scotia exhibitors is 137,—as compared with 69, the largest number yet reached at former Exhibitions abroad. It is believed that our exhibition in Paris this year will not only be more effective, but at much less expense than on previous occasions.

We learn from the Chronicle that Connolly and Lucey, the two men who a few days ago surrendered themselves as deserters from Her Majesty's service, have been sentenced to three months imprisonment at Melville Island North West Arm.

The steamer Linda is advertised in the Yarmouth papers to commence her trips between that port and Boston on the 5th March, leaving the latter port on that day.

NEWFOUNDLAND.—The Merlin arrived from Newfoundland on Saturday.

The Legislature was in session, having opened on the 31st ult. No business of general importance was being transacted. The Lieutenant Governor made no reference to Confederation in his speech.

It appears that great destitution prevails in many parts of the Island. There has been a large number of deaths from scarlatina.

The loss to the province by the potato blight last fall is said to have been over £150,000.
