Prince Edward Island.

We perceive by the P. E. I. papers that Rev. John Davis was advertised to lecture before the Y. M. C. Association on "The Millennium."

Prince Edward Island is much engaged in political matters. The late dismissal of the Hon. Mr. Henderson from the Executive Council was a rather unusual incident in politics. Having lost his election and seat in the legislature, he contended that as he expected shortly to be returned for another constituency he should not be dismissed. His colleagues held a different opinion.

The new drill shed in Charlottetown was a few days since opened by the Lieut. Governor. There were nearly 400 volunteers present on the occasion.

The Summerside Journal says that the times are particularly dull there at present. Funds are tight and labor is very low. Last winter over twenty vessels were on the stocks, but this year there are scarcely half a dozen.

New Brunswick.

We read of City horse-shovels being used in New Brunswick in leveling the snow after the late storm. Why not in Halifax?

The Exhibition building at Fredericton took fire on Wednesday last. The flames were speedily extinguished, the building being used by a company of the 22nd Regt.

The Intelligencer notices the death of the Rev. Samuel Hart, a Baptist minister, resident in Carleton County.

Canada.

TORONTO, C. W. Jan. 24.—The Fenian trials are resumed. The Jury found a verdict against Thomas Gallagher, whose sentence was deferred. James King who claimed to be a Confederate soldier, and for whom much sympathy was felt by Southerners residing in Toronto was acquitted.

Jan. 25.—William Orr, one of the Fenian prisoners, was tried to-day by a jury of one-half Americans. The evidence being insufficient to convict, the jury brought in a verdict of not guilty, and the prisoner was discharged. Barney Dunn was then placed in the dock; a verdict of guilty was returned against him; sentence deferred. In the case of Frederick Fry a verdict of not guilty was returned. John Hughes, against whom a true bill was on the evidence of the escaped prisoner Rozall, was also discharged. Rozall not being forthcoming. The case of Jas. Deamond was disposed of in the same manner.

QUEBEC, Jan. 14.—A draft for £380 sterling has been authorized per cable for the relief fund, from Greenock Scotland. The gold medal of the Quebec Curling Club was won by Charles Poston, who scored 15.

Last season twenty-two vessels arrived here from France and cleared for French ports, showing a large increase of direct trade with France. Seven vessels were built here last year and sold to France.
