Dominion and Foreign News.

Ontario.

There was a run got up on the Royal Canadian Bank of Toronto on the 24th October but the demand for specie was met promptly and the soundness of the institution was satisfactorily proved.

The Toronto Leader suggests that an agent should be sent to the old country, specially entrusted with the duty of securing 5000 servant-girls for emigration to Canada.

Quebec.

QUEBEC, Oct. 28.—The ringleaders concerned in the late demonstration of the ship carpenters' strike were arrested to-day.

HEAVY.—Judgment was given at Quebec on the 25th ult. in the case of the steamer Secret, for having run down the steamer Lake St. Peter, on the 8th of August last.

TAX ON TIMBER.—It is stated that the Quebec Government has in contemplation the imposition of charges on timber leaving that Province, of the nature of the export duty.

LATEST FROM EUROPE.

ENGLAND.—London, Oct. 30.—Liverpool has become the centre of the Fenian excitement. The Volunteers Armories are guarded, and the Police patrols have been doubled.

Oct. 31.—At the session yesterday the Special Commission for the trial of the Fenian prisoners a motion was made by the Counsel for the defence, that the accused be tried by a mixed panel, composed in equal numbers of Catholic and Protestant jurymen.

Prussia declines to receive Bavaria into the Zollverein on the terms proposed by the Bavarian Government.

A public dinner was given to Mr. DIsraeli, Chancellor of the Exchequer, yesterday, at Edinburgh. Mr. DIsraeli in answer to a complimentary toast, rose and made a characteristic speech. He gave a history of the Reform ques-

tion, recounted the action of different political parties in England in relation to the subject, and argued strongly in justification of the Tory party for their course in advocating and carrying through the parliament the representation of the people's bill.

The statement that the Emperor Francis Joseph is to visit King William of Prussia is contradicted.

The provincial correspondent of a journal possessing a semi official character says Prussia will interfere in the Roman difficulty should such action on her part be necessary to preserve the peace of Europe.

Lord Wm. Ross the celebrated astronomer died yesterday in the 67th year of his age.

Nov. 3.—The trial of Gen. Warren for complicity in Fenianism is concluded. He was found guilty of treason and felony.

MANCHESTER, Nov. 1.—The trial of Allen and four other prisoners, was concluded to-day before the special commission. They were all convicted of murder and received the sentence of death.

IRELAND.—Dublin, Nov. 1.—The trial of Gen. Warren is now progressing before the Special Commission.

Great excitement has been caused here by the shooting of two policemen on Wednesday night. A proclamation has been issued by the Government, offering a reward of £1000 for the arrest of the assassins.

FRANCE.—Paris, Oct. 27.—A banquet was given yesterday by the foreign commissioners of the Exposition to the French members, at which speeches were made and cordial feelings manifested.

GREECE.—Athens, A telegram from London on the 1st Inst. says: "The marriage of King George of Greece to the Princess Olga, took place to-day with great pomp and ceremony."

THE GARIBALDIAN MOVEMENT.

The Telegraphic despatches of the past week shew no very decided change in the position of affairs in Italy, although something definite may be looked for at any hour.

Florence, Oct. 27.—Two battles have been fought between the Volunteers under Garibaldi and the Papal troops. The first took place at Montorondo and the second was fought further south.

London, Oct. 28.—The French fleet of iron clad war vessels destined for service in the Roman waters, left Toulon under an Imperial order at six o'clock this morning.

Paris, Oct. 27.—The Monteur to-day says the fleet at Toulon had been kept back at the request of the King of Italy, but it has now sailed for the Italian coast, because no Cabinet has been formed at Florence.

Oct. 31.—Semi official evening journals say that the advance of the Italian troops into Papal provinces, was ordered by the Italian Government without the consent of France; and this action, they declare, has brought a crisis in the relations between the two countries, which is dangerous to peace.

Florence, Oct. 31.—The Pontifical troops have all been withdrawn from the country, and are concentrated within the fortifications of Rome. The Garibaldians have taken possession of a portion of the Railway between Rome and Civitavecchia, and torn up the rails.

London, Oct. 30.—The French troops now occupy Civitavecchia, and more are embarking at Toulon for Italy.

Regarding the report that the Italian army had crossed the Roman frontier, it is reported that the Pope has informed the French Government that if King Victor Emmanuel entered Rome, he, the Pope, will leave. Gen. Garibaldi has been ordered by the commander of the Italian forces to disarm and disperse his forces.

A new Italian Cabinet has been formed with General Merlino at the head. Owing to the serious aspect of the political affairs the National Diet will be called together at an early day.

London, Oct. 30.—Gen. Garibaldi, the elder is still in position before Mentevado at the head of a revolutionary force numbering as reports go, from 4,000 to 5,000 men.

Florence, Nov. 1.—The Nazione of this morning denies the truth of the rumor that French troops have arrived at Rome. The Italian army which has entered the Papal territory is under command of General Cialdini.

London, Nov. 1, 3.30 p. m.—Telegraphic despatches from Florence giving the situation of affairs at Rome have been received. The French troops which were landed at Civitavecchia report since they have arrived there were no demonstrations whatever.

Nov. 3.—The French troops have entered the Holy City. The Italian reserve has been called out.

Gen. Menabrea, Prime Minister of Italy, in a note justifies the advance of the Italian troops into the Papal territory. He says the dignity of the Italian Government and the violation of the September Treaty by the French required this movement.

To the summons of the King, Garibaldi replies by refusing to disband his army or give up his enterprise against Rome unless a charge is made in the present reactionary Ministry which will put the Government of Italy in accord with the national will.

South America.

BRAZIL.—A telegram from London on Friday last, says: As the last mail steamer was leaving Rio Janeiro a report reached that city that the Brazilian troops had captured the town of Pilar, called by the natives Neembun, the chief port of Paraguay.
