ITALY.—The sessions of the Italian Parliament have been quite stormy, and the debate recently violent, the liberal members assailing the ministers.

It is thought that the Italian Chamber of Deputies will repeat their vote of 1861, declaring Rome as the national capital of the kingdom.

A despatch from Florence denies the story that Garibaldi has again escaped from Caprera.

Russia.—It is reported that the Prince Gortschakoff has resigned the Chancellorship of the Russian Empire.
