Memoranda.

Brigs Rogers and Laura, of P. E. Island, bound to Great Britain, are at Port Hawkesbury both leaky, and will require to be taken on the marine slip for repairs. Capt Kenny, of schoa Sprig, of Barrington, at this port on Friday, reports left Bay of Islands on 28th Nov. The schoa Hector, of Lunenburg and Nancy, of Shelburne, expected to leave on the 8th Dec. After leaving, Capt Kenny reports the Bay closed with ice, and it is understood a large number of vessels are frozen in. The schoa Bertha, Sounder and G. Ansell of Eastport, Me., sailed in company with the Sprig, and parted on 30th. Capt Kenny fears both vessels have been wrecked. The Schoa experienced very heavy gales on 28th and 30th.
