Another important improvement in the organs of this house consists in the ease and facility with which the blow-pedals are operated. The expression of the instrument is not in the least diminished and it has the peculiarity that is not obtained by the usual method with us, the employment of the stop called-" Expression, but by the simple action of the feet which move upon the blow-pedals with more or less rapidity according as it is desired to increase or diminish the body of tone. Thus all the difficulties proceeding from this source in our French Harmoniums disappear as it by enchantment.

1st. The amelioration of the tones to a close resemblance to the tones of the pipe Organ.

2nd. Facility of execution by the application of a new system of expression more practical, placing it within the ability o: all players,

If we are not mistaken, and it such is in short the end which they have designed to accomplish, we do not besitate to declare that they have perfectly succeeded.

As regards the simplicity and the substantialness of their construction, these organs can be equally considered as models of tabrication. It is impossible to attain to greater perlection and care in the minutest details --All the instruments which we have particularly examined in the interior are largely manualactured with the aid of ingenious machinery. The reeds themselves are thus produced with mathematical accuracy: the voicing of these reeds is accomplished in a similar manner, from which results a unitormity or more properly speaking an equality of tones which it is impossible to obtain by hand work. The ma jority of our most celebrated organists have two boards and 21 octaves of pedals has est ecial ly claimed attention : this instrument is indeed most admirable in all respects, and our accomplished virtuosos had drawn from it magnificent effects, playing by turn the music of Bach and compositions of the modern school. "It is a church organ in miniature" said one. "It is more, adds M - It is a happy combination of both church and reed organ.

We cannot doubt Messrs. M. & H. will obtain from our exposition the high recompense due their invention and their talent.
