

LATEST FROM UNITED STATES.

RICHMOND, Va., May 9.—A serious riot occurred in this city this evening. A large crowd of negroes gathered in Cary street to witness a trial of the engines of the Richmond Fire Department and Wilmington, Del., Fire Company. A fight took place, and a negro was arrested. Mobs of negroes rescued him, but he was again captured. Upon arriving at the upper station house the negro mob again rescued him, throwing paving stones at the police. Captain Jenkins of the police, two sergeants and one private were injured, two seriously. By this time the mob had swelled to 1000 blacks. Gen. Schofield sent up a company of the 11th Regiment and came on the ground himself. He spoke to the mob, commanding them to disperse, but the order was disobeyed. The soldiers then charged bayonets and drove them away.

RAPID GROWTH.—The Mayor of Louisville, Ky., in his message to the Common Council, states that the population of the city has increased from 80,000 to 145,000 during the past two years.

ENTERPRIZING.—The Philadelphia Press learns that a number of American gentlemen, capitalists of unlimited resources and credit, have offered to undertake the construction of the contemplated Lake Huron and Ontario ship canal, connecting the great Western lakes with the St. Lawrence river.

THE WHEAT in the United States is said to be in excellent condition and gives prospect of a fine crop. In Pennsylvania and Maryland there were never better prospects. In Ohio there is a promise of the heaviest crop ever raised in this country. In Wisconsin the winter has been very favorable for fall sown wheat. In Illinois, as the snow disappears, wherever wheat was sown it looks well and promises an abundant yield. In Missouri and adjoining states it is said the crop never looked more promising.

RICHMOND, Va., May 13.—Jefferson Davis was brought before the U. S. District Court today, on a charge of treason. He was bound over for trial in this Court, which meet next November, in the sum of one hundred thousand dollars. An immense crowd gathered in the court room to get a view of the arch traitor.

LATEST FROM EUROPE.

ENGLAND.—A cable despatch from London via New York, May 7th, dated 6th (evening), says that the Reform demonstration in Hyde Park to-day was an immense affair. It numbered 100,000, embracing roughs, gentlemen, women, children, and working men. Sir Robert Walpole's proclamation that the assembly was illegal was posted around upon every available spot, but proved utterly abortive.

The Morning Papers announced that the Government would not attempt to put down the meeting, but all the troops in London and vicinity were under arms. A large force of Police were concealed in a secluded part of the Park.

Fifteen separate meetings were organized, at one of which a woman spoke in favor of universal suffrage. One stand devoted to religious speeches the most revolutionary sentiments uttered by speakers were loudly cheered by the crowd. The reformers advised order, and practically carried out the idea by driving off the trees in the Park crowds of Roughs who were perched in their branches. The entire press denounces Government. The Tories treat the meeting as a mob, while the Reformers claim them as popular triumphs. The bitterest feeling exists on both sides, and all London is intensely excited. Some of the meetings are still in progress, and will continue until a late hour.

London, May 8th.—The demands of the Prussian Cabinet in regard to Luxemburg are assuming a menacing tendency.

A special cable despatch contains the following:—London, May 8th.—The Peace Conference met yesterday. The proceedings are secret, but it is known however, that France is willing to accept the dismantling of the Fort of Luxemburg, so that it will remain a menace.

Prussia will not consent to this unless the great powers give a guarantee of a settlement which would bind them to engage in a war against the future designs of France on Prussia, in case they sought aggrandizement.

England hesitates to give the guarantee, and the session adjourned to enable the representatives to receive telegraphic instructions from their respective governments. In the meantime war preparations are proceeding on both sides.

France is buying arms both in England and Spain, and the Prussian troops of the regular army are being held in readiness for support at Luxemburg.

Bismarck declares the situation now more serious than ever before.

Russia is converting muskets into breech-loaders. Reports from Warsaw state that the Russian Government is concentrating troops and munitions of war in the Province of Poland.

May 9th.—The Peace Conference held a second session to-day; the following basis for the deliberations of the Conference was agreed upon:—First, the territory of Luxemburg is to remain in the possession of the King of Holland as Grand Duke of Luxemburg; second, the neutralization of the Grand Duchy is to be guaranteed by all the European Powers participating in the Conference; third, the forts of Luxemburg are to be razed.

May 10th.—Earl Derby stated in Parliament

last night, that he considered the preservation of peace in Europe no longer a question of doubt.

In the House of Commons a division took place on the amendment made by the Government to the Reform Bill, and the amendment was adopted.

Hon. S. L. Walpole, Home Secretary, has resigned his position in the Cabinet.

Hon. G. H. Curzon has been appointed Home Secretary, in place of Mr. Walpole, and Earl Devon replaces Mr. Curzon as Chairman of the Poor Law Board.

May 11th.—The success of the Derby Government on the vote on the reform bill to day insures its presentation.

The death sentence of the convicted Fenian Doran has been committed to a long term of imprisonment. Earl Derby officially says the Government will not make public the real history of recent Fenian uprising, on account of apprehensions of troubles with certain foreign Governments which are involved in the plot.

The treaty of the great powers in the Luxemburg question will be formally signed by the participants to-morrow.

May 12.—The treaty which was signed yesterday by members of the Peace Congress has been ratified by their respective Governments.—By the terms of the settlement the Fortress of Luxemburg is to be evacuated by the Prussians within a month from the date of the treaty.

The Globe of this evening says the treaty for the disposition of the Luxemburg question was signed to-day by all the powers participating in the conference. His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales is at the Paris Exhibition.

IRELAND.—Dublin, May 9th.—The Fenian prisoner Connolly was to-day convicted of high treason by the Special Commission, and the prisoner Clarke, was acquitted, and discharged from custody.

RUSSIA.—St. Petersburg, May 6.—The ice went off the river Neva and harbor to-day, the ports of St. Petersburg and Cronstadt are again open to commerce.

May 9.—The Emperor Alexander will visit Paris in June next.

PRUSSIA.—Berlin, May 9.—The Prussian Diet yesterday accepted the new constitution for the North German Confederacy.

May 12.—The French Cabinet has made satisfactory explanations to Prussia in regard to the recent warlike preparations in France.

MISCELLANEOUS.

QUEEN'S VICTORIA AS AN AUTHOR.—The fact is not generally known, either here or in America, that Her Majesty Queen Victoria has written a work entitled *Leaves from a Journal in the Highlands*, which consists of about forty papers, descriptive of her life at Balmoral and the neighbourhood. The work is illustrated by photographs and woodcuts from Her Majesty's sketches. It contains, among other interesting matter, three long accounts of *incognito* journeys made by the Prince Consort and herself to different parts of Scotland, and the adventures they met with. In one of the papers she gives an account of the preaching of Dr. Norman McLeod, of Glasgow, and after stating how astonished she was that any one could preach, "so eloquently and touchingly without notes," she adds, "and then he prayed so kindly for me and the Prince in the after prayer that I was deeply touched; but when he invoked God's blessings on the children I felt a great lump come in my throat." She had not expected to be prayed for so kindly by a Presbyterian, and least of all did she expect him to remember the children. I think there is something touching in this simple note of the Queen wife and mother which shows how true a woman she is. Only forty copies of the work have been printed for special friends and favorites, but sooner or later it will, of course, be reprinted, and will be a most interesting addition to contemporary literature. What would the world not give for such a work by Queen Mary or Queen Elizabeth? The copy from which I have quoted here on the title-pages the following inscription:—

"To dear Jeannie G., in remembrance of many, many happy hours—gone never to return again. From V. R." Her Majesty has also written the preface to a life of the Prince Consort, which General Gray is preparing for private distribution.—London Correspondent of *Springfield (Massachusetts) Republican*.

SIR MORTON Peto, says the London *Free Press*, has done all that an honourable man can do. He has met his constituents and given them as full an explanation as circumstances would then permit. If we are rightly informed, he has even placed his seat at their disposal. He has, in the face of Parliament and before the country challenged an impartial and searching inquiry into his conduct. Such an inquiry it was not possible "to manipulate for any purpose of his own." His proposition, though rejected by the House, elicited from its leaders the highest testimonies of confidence and respect; and, so far as parliamentary opinion is concerned, Sir Morton Peto has every reason to be satisfied. We heartily congratulate him on the result. In these transactions, so calamitous to his fortune as well as injurious to others, he may have erred in judgment, but his personal honour is unstained. It is one of the misfortunes of great eminence and virtue when some sudden reverse comes, to be selected as the special object of calumny and reproach. But the time is not distant, we are sure, when those who are most loud in their denunciations of Sir Morton Peto will fasten the blame on the right parties, and do justice to one who has been made, as a writer justly remarks, "a convenient scape-goat."
