The meeting continued from 11 o'clock, A.M., until 5 P.M., when it separated with three cheers for the Queen.

A house near the line between Annapolis and Kings counties, owned and occupied by Mr. David Messenger, was destroyed by fire on Saturday last.

N. S. SALT.—The Antigonish Casket says Mr Josiah Deacon, manager of the "Nova Scotia Salt Works and Exploration Company," succeeded on the 27th ult., in striking a flow of brine of 154 feet deep, near the Harbor Landing. The bore is 3 1/2 inches in diameter. The brine continues to flow. A small tin of this salt, the first obtained from the works, has been placed by B. Wier, Esq., in the Reading Room for inspection. The yield was ten per cent. of salt from three hundred pounds of brine boiled. The quality is very good.

AGRICULTURAL OPERATIONS are being commenced in all parts of the province. The spring is however regarded as a week or two more backward than usual.

SYDNEY, C. B.—The C. B. News contains a most satisfactory notice of the examination of the Sydney Academy.

It has four Departments as follows:— Primary, with 77 children, under Miss Hill; Intermediate, with 42 pupils, under the charge of Miss Harrington; Preparatory, with 36 scholars, taught by Mr. Morrison;

The High School with 21 students, under Mr. H. C. Creed. The writer of the notice adds:

"Classes were examined in Geography, British, North American, and General History, Reading, Grammatical Analysis, Arithmetic—slate and mental, Geometry—as far as 6th book of Euclid, Algebra, Mensuration, French, Latin, Greek, &c. Several original Essays of great excellence were read, and an amusing Dramatic Dialogue was spoken in capital style by five or six of the boys.

Revs. Dr. MacLeod, Dr. Uniacke, J. Quinan, P. Prestwood and W. B. Boggs gave addresses, and expressed their gratification at the proficiency manifested by the Pupils and the good order and attention to the work in hand.

It must be evident to every person present at the examination, that the Schools in Sydney are now established on a good basis, and that under the present Educational Act, and with the competent, earnest and painstaking Teachers now in charge of our Schools, we have before us a bright educational future."

NORTH SYDNEY, too, we believe, makes liberal provision for educational purposes.

We are glad to hear that a GIRLS' INDUSTRIAL SCHOOL has been commenced and is in successful operation on the Tower Road. With proper arrangements and appliances such an institution presents a wide field of usefulness, and is deserving of the liberal support of christian philanthropists.

PRESENTATION.—The Poplar Grove Sabbath Scholars a few days ago presented their Superintendent Charles Robson, Esq., with a very pleasing address, and a testimonial of esteem consisting of Four Electro-plate Silver Salvers.

On the same evening I. H. Rand, Esq., gave a model lesson to a number of the scholars of that Sabbath School, in presence of the Superintendent and Teachers. TO THE ELECTORS OF THE COUNTY OF HALIFAX.

GENTLEMEN,— In a few days the House of Assembly will be dissolved, and new elections in the course of the summer will take place for seats in the House of Commons in the Dominion of Canada; and as I have been nominated for one of those seats by my fellow citizens, at a large and influential meeting held at Temperance Hall for that purpose, I beg respectfully to solicit from you a renewal of that confidence with which you have honored me during three successive Provincial Parliaments.

I have now to address myself for the first time to the electors of the Eastern Division of this county. It will be seen by the Act of Union, that both divisions form one Constituency, and I feel I have some claim to their support, not in the discharge of my public duty, in all that related to the local interests of the county, I have known no east or west.

During the twelve years that I have had the honor of a seat in the Legislature, the Province has enjoyed a remarkable degree of progressive prosperity. Wealth has rapidly increased, and the revenue has always been sufficient to provide for the public expenditure. Without the burthen of increased taxation, the coast has been lighted, the rivers bridged, many lines of roads penetrating in every direction opened up, and railways east and west, to grasp the trade of the Gulf of St. Lawrence and the Bay of Fundy, placed under contract, which when completed will confer lasting benefits on the people of this Province. Education has been provided for, and large grants given to steamboats, packets, and ferries.

These are the results of the combined action of your public men, in which I have had a humble share; and now a bright gleam of hope for the future has cheered the land by the passage of the Union Act and the Credit Bill, in the Imperial Parliament, to both of which Her Most Gracious Majesty has given her assent,—uniting these Provinces in the happy bonds of Union, and placing within their reach the means of constructing that great public work, "the Intercolonial Railway," for which they have so long and so earnestly labored.

I hope a just judgment of my past conduct will entitle me to the same measure of good will which has been extended to me during my twelve years of public life; and in the meantime, I again respectfully and earnestly solicit from you a continuance of that confidence which has always cheered me on in the discharge of my public duty.
